

Con Souvlis, Larger Than Life

As I walk into Betta Electrical in Torquay to meet possibly one of the most photographed, reported on, and written about men in Hervey Bay, and indeed the Fraser Coast. I think about all of the things that I have read about him over the years that have always made him appear larger than life.

Con Souvlis spies me as I walk towards him, his handshake is firm but I see the twinkle in his eyes as he pulls me towards him for a kiss on the cheek

We take a seat at his favourite table that is adorned with his '50 Years in Business' paper that he is very proud of it is joined by magazines, books about the war, and of course, 'King Con - Biography of Con Souvlis'.

Con was born in Innisfail, Queensland on September 13, 1925. He was the first child of Michael and Chrissanthi Souvlis who came from the remote Greek Island called Kastelorizo.

His mothers name comes up quite often during our conversation. Con remembers how his father Michael was away a lot and he helped his mother feed and care for the family. He also talked about his love for her, and tells me of what a great lady she was. Con talks about how his mother used to ring a bell as the trains were coming into Brisbane station, and sold pies to the weary travellers.


Married once to a girl called Yvonne, they had four children named, Jonathon, Tina, Chris and Shanna, unfortunately the relationship did not work out. Con has remained single ever since and has surrounded himself with family and friends.

Con describes himself as, "A proud Greek-Australian, who fought in the Second World War for Australia". Throughout our conversation the war years are brought up often, those years affected Con throughout his life, he talks about seeing eight soldiers dying in front of him after drowning in the Tagessi River Swamp.

Throughout his life Con has been known as a leading business man and philanthropist. From selling fruit door to door, owning a paint store and Electrical stores, along with a Newspaper, and dabbling in real estate. Con has called Hervey Bay home since 1959, the population was roughly 3000 at the time, and the Esplanade was just a dirt road. What Con saw was a place filled with a huge amount of opportunity for those that wanted to grasp it, as Con did in spades.

With a massive heart Con has given hundreds of thousands of dollars over the years back to his community. He is patron of many clubs, groups and organisations. He has also helped found and funded lots of projects from the Vietnam Vets, Meals on Wheels, the Extension of Freedom Park, and many sporting groups, just to skim the surface. Con has also given 27.5 acres of land to Bay Crest Retirement Village over the years.

We end our conversation with a photo session in the 'Lazy-boy' section of Betta Electrical. On the way Con holds my hand tight as I escort him down the aisle. He spies a customer, and we stop. Con looks the Customer straight in the eye and says, "And how may I help you today". The customer assures Con that he has been well looked after, then when Con is ready we keep going towards our photo date. It is hard to believe that Con will be 92 in September. As we part we share another kiss. I think Con leaves everybody he meets with a lasting impression. The man definitely is larger than life.





Medieval Swordplay **Brought to Life**

Nathan Richter's name is becoming well known around the Fraser Coast, although we don't always get to clearly see his face as he is quite often in full medieval costume. Nathan and his medieval group, 'Fléau des Français', can often be seen showing off their sword skills at various festivals to everyone's delight.

Nathan Richter is also an Actor, and recently won an award for Best Actor, through the Australian Screen Industry Network for a short film that he starred in called, 'Ruby'. This film was with Harlequin Films Australia. The film only took one day to shoot, and was made in 2016. Nathan remembers that he was feeling very unwell on the day of filming, but this actually helped his performance, as he had to act tired and fatigued in the film. Nathan said that he, "was very shocked, surprised, and excited to win Best Actor, certainly not something that happens everyday".

Nathan has also been lucky enough to act in a few Ads for the Bundaberg Motor Group.. Those of you who go to the movies will have seen him on the big screen, or on television. He has also featured in the Ad for Lifestyle 24 Gym.

Medieval Re-enactment has been a passion of Nathan's since he was a young teenager of about fifteen or sixteen years of age. he started out by doing some theatrical Rapier with friends, this is basically theatrical sword fighting. Nathan then found a re-enactment group to join, before deciding to start up one of his own called, 'Fléau des Français', and as they say the rest is history.

The groups main focus is on the period of the rule of King Edward the third, 1327 to 1377. But they do cater for the 14th Century so any time in the 1300's is fine. That particular point was

chosen because it was a time when there were some pretty major historical events. There was lots of upheaval, the Black Death was happening, and there was a major war between two super powers at the time.

The majority of the costumes and accessories are able to be purchased here in Australia. Some of the members are skilled enough to make their own garments, and bits and pieces. Armour wise you can get the majority of it here. Nathan has made plate armour of the 14th Century style, this is transitional, going from a partial plate to full plates, he has also made various protective garments.

When the weather cools down again the group will be back out at Dayman Park practising for all to watch. In the summer heat they constantly have to worry about heat stroke and dehydration, especially with the armour and all of the clothing that they wear. Nathan will be planning sometime probably in February to start getting back into light training once again. Not full on combat just yet. Just getting back into some drills, and footwork, as they prepare to brush the rust of and begin the new year.

Nathan said, "We are constantly after more members. Our Trainees recommended age is fourteen or fifteen for mental maturity. All people that are under eighteen years of age must have a parent or guardian with them. I always like to meet them face to face before training starts as well. No gear is needed until much later, other good attributes to have are enthusiasm, and great listening skills as it can be a very dangerous activity". 

The Engineers Arms Marketplace

I was lucky enough to be able to sit down and have a chat with Jenny Elliot about her new venture, the Engineers Arms Marketplace. Jenny is Maryborough born and bred and is very knowledgeable and passionate about the area. She is a tireless worker within her community and has been heavily involved in the Tech Challenge, The Duncan Chapman Memorial and the Maryborough Chamber of Commerce to name a few.

I was excited to delve into the history of The Engineers Arms in Maryborough and it didn't disappoint. The former hotel has a rich, at times tragic past. It was last used as a hotel in 1951, it has since been a Boarding/ Guest House, community centre and restaurant. The building itself has a very distinctive shape as it was originally built on a five way intersection, that has since turned into a four way. - Kim Parnell, Editor

Now fast-forward to 2017:

The Engineers Arms has been transformed into a bustling marketplace, providing an affordable exhibition and retail space for local crafters and artisans. Sharing the space are Jacqualina Designs, and Candescents.

The Engineers Arms Marketplace, a small business initiative, is a

concept that has evolved through feedback from the local community to address the gap in the range of local souvenirs and giftware available for purchase in Maryborough.

The Engineers Arms Marketplace will initially operate 5 days per week from Wednesday to Sunday from 10am to 3pm. Opening 14 December, 2016

The Engineers Arms Marketplace team invites applications from local micro-businesses, artists, artisans, creators, craftsmen, cooks, designers, producers and collectors to showcase their wares and offer a diverse selection of individual pop up stalls with distinctive and inspired products that are of a high quality, sourced, designed and produced locally.

Opportunities exist to encourage local community artisans and crafters to supply suitable merchandise on a consignment basis.

Local crafters and artisans can display their unique wares at individual stalls which include original handmade craft, condiments, gourmet pantry items, soaps, candles, sculpture, collectables, vintage, retro, homewares, accessories, jewellery, woodwork, artwork, photography, paintings, farm fresh produce, books and souvenirs.

There is also a book corner featuring books by local authors and publications documenting Maryborough's rich history.

In 2017, we aim to have a Themed Sunday Market once a month coinciding with the very popular Sunday in the Park. We envisage that these Sundays at the Engineers Arms Marketplace will become a local farmers market with a range of produce and flavours from the region.

The goals and benefits of the Engineers Arms Marketplace in terms of outcomes will be:

- Engaging the local community in discussion and/or comment about the transformation of the iconic Engineers Arms building into a bustling marketplace using social media platforms and other initiatives will increase visitor numbers and boost local revenue.
- Proactive and positive way of utilising the local community as ambassadors to promote the Fraser Coast region will increase visitor numbers.
- A diverse range of stock focusing on the local area creates opportunity to initiate conversation with customers increasing destination awareness generating increased local revenue and visitor numbers.

IT'S ALL ABOUT THE COFFEE

Coffee, Kopi, Kaffe, whatever you like to call it, we mostly agree that it is a beverage that thrills, excites and energises.

Although the majority of coffee drinkers think they are connoisseurs in reality we have all rarely touched the surface of what coffee is, has been and is yet to become. I have dealt with this magic bean for nearly 30 years and to this day I still find it fascinating as it reveals yet another layer of knowledge to me.

In this article I will at least attempt to begin to pass some of that knowledge to those who enjoy this wondrous beverage and at the same time I hope that I too can learn a few more things to do with coffee. If I have one hope from writing this that would be to turn the Fraser Coast region into a true coffee culture where as many people ordering coffee know as much hopefully as the person making the coffee and if that improves the quality of what is served all well and good.

So where to start, perhaps with some trivial facts. Most people recognise that the majority of coffee is grown between the Tropic of Capricorn and the Tropic of Cancer, this does not mean that this is the only region. In fact Australia has some of the southern most growing regions in the world. Most of us recognise the difference between Robusta (Instant coffee) and Arabica (Espresso) even though this changes with blends of coffee. Robusta simply is generally grown at lower levels and is more pest resistant, Arabica higher levels and a little more delicate with its surrounds. Higher caffeine levels in a bean may mean there are more pests about where it is grown, by increasing the caffeine levels this becomes plants main protection system.


Another misconception is the darkness of the roasted coffee bean means the higher the caffeine level. This is almost entirely a myth as the longer you roast coffee the more caffeine is cooked out, this is why most of the roasters walk a fine line between the extra cocoa and caramel flavours slightly darker roasts bring out and the lighter more delicate herbal, floral, earthy and berry flavours in the lighter roast spectrum.

Organic coffee is not necessarily always what you think you are getting, especially if the coffee is imported. I will explain, even though coffee is generally grown organically it maybe dried and processed naturally keeping with the organic requirements but it is then graded and packed in Hessian sacks to be exported all around the world. When the coffee comes into Australia it is sprayed with various pesticides to remove any little creepy crawlies that may have hitched a ride. Now because the coffee is in Hessian sacks the spray goes right through onto the beans, now all of the lovely organic beans within the sack are no longer organic. There are roasters out there who have found ways around this issue by packing the beans in foil bags within the Hessian sack preventing the sprays getting to the bean. The other way to get around this is of course to buy the beautiful Australian grown beans the majority of which are Organic.

As you know doubt will have noticed there are many cafes in the area and everyone has a different opinion as to what is a good coffee and what isn't. The best thing is it is individual,

you may like a coffee in one café but at the most popular café you may not like their coffee. Nobody is right or wrong, it's individual, if everyone made the same coffee the same way then we would have way too many cafes in town. Finally a piece of advice: just because a coffee shop is not full doesn't necessarily mean their coffee is bad sometimes the busy café is just happens to be convenient. We are creatures of comfort and generally don't like change, so shake off those shackles try a different coffee blend. You may just find something interesting that you hadn't thought possible. So get out there, support our local cafes.

In the Kitchen with Gavin Chin

Head Chef & Owner, Federal Hotel Motel

Who doesn't like a bit of history, and I got it in spades when I popped into the Federal Hotel to visit Owners, Gavin Chin and his wife Jessica. The hotel was built in 1884, by Architect Willoughby Powell, and retains all of its old-time charm. (and some of its ghosts), Gavin is the Chef, and loves whipping up dishes in the kitchen.

What did you do before you became a Chef?

"I have always been a Chef. I have done a lot of different jobs within the industry, like running little Cafes, and Restaurants. But it wasn't until Maryborough that I ran a pub, I was more of a fine dining Cafe Chef and there wasn't very much of that around. Jessica is a teacher and was moved to the area in 2013, We liked Maryborough. And wanted to live here, I had worked in all of the pubs here in Maryborough, so we thought we would have at crack at one ourselves".

What is the most popular dish on the Federal Hotel's menu?

"The Halumi Salad, and the Southern fried Chicken and Buttermilk Waffles, we have had these on the special board and haven't been able to take them off. We also make our own sauces like Sriracha Cream, for our waffles, it is a spicy cream. Going back to nose to tail we are seeing lots of Offal these days as well as sweet breads and livers. We have found that there is really a good dining culture in Maryborough its Just taken us a little while to bring it out of the woodwork".

What would be the best way to sum up your menu?

"Modern Style Gastro, (meaning food). When pubs started they never sold food in hotels, the street vendors would

be outside the hotel. People would come to drink then go out for food. Then someone had the bright idea to start cooking their own food and in England it became the Gastro Pub. It was basic, hardy but quality food, it was a good meal. Nothing to flashy, you won't find any micro herbs or anything. We make absolutely everything and take a lot of pride in what we do".

Do you use many local suppliers?

"As much as possible yes. Most of our fruit and vegetables are bought locally here in Maryborough. It is very hard not to buy a lot of stuff without buying bulk. We use Sugar Coast Seafood for all of our Seafood needs, and Greg's Quality Meats in Tinana".

What advice would you give a novice just starting out?

"Stop watching TV shows, it is nothing like it. It is very hard work, very hot and stressful at times, but it is also rewarding and addictive. I found hospitality in general is the industry where you don't have to conform to anything, you can be who you are. And you have all the avenues to express who you are through your food, through your personality, and through your service".

Tell us about your speciality craft beers?

"During the rise of Craft beer, so many fantastic craft breweries around the country have popped up. There are so many different flavours and styles. We have over 50 craft beers, Stone & Wood from Bryon Bay being one of them. We have started to sell some from the Bagara Brewery as well. Stone & Wood Pacific Ale is our most popular".
