

YOU HAVE ROCKED WITH ROSE TATTON SINCE THE BAND BEGUN WAY BACK II WHAT WERE THE EARLY DAYS LIKE?


We actually started rehearsing in 1975 and would play three nights a week at the former Chequers Nightclub in Sydney, this was the place to be and to be seen during the 60's and 70's. Among many other top artists both Dionne Warwick, and Shirley Bassey played there as well. We often say that Rose Tattoo was actually born on the eve of 1975 and 1976 at Chequers Nightclub as we literally did not leave the stage during this period.

ONE OF MY FAVOURITE ALL TIME SONGS IS THE 1987 SODE: "SUBDEMY FROM THE ALBUM, BEAT LIKE A DRUM". THIS SONG ALSO BECAME FAMOUS WORLDWIDE AFTER APPEARING IN AN EPISODE OF NEIGHBOURS, (THE WEDDING OF SCOT FAND CHARLENE). THIS SONG IS TIMELESS AND IS STILL HEARD AT WEDDINGS AND FUNERALS. WHAT DOES IT FEEL LIKE TO HAVE A SONG THAT RESONATES WITH PEOPLE STILL TODAY? IS IT TRUE THAT YOU DON'T LIKE PERFORMING THIS SONG?

Well I can be persuaded by copious amounts of money. I remember that I was contacted once by a wedding planner that asked me if I would sing that song at David Campbell's wedding. David is a wonderful singer and performer. I was not allowed to tell anyone as it had to remain confidential. Anyhow, the wedding planner was instructed to get me at any cost, so of course I said yes.

I didn't know until later that an eight year old relative of David's would sing the lyrics to the show over and over again into the mirror and was a huge fan, that was pretty special.

What a lot of people don't realise is that my daughter was actually the inspiration for the song. I had made a solemn vow to my daughter that I would be the best dad that I could be. It was about that all consuming love that we have for our children. This song was liberating, and was about what I was in the past and who I was about to become.



FOR THOSE WHO HAVE NEVER SEEN ROSE TATTOO WHAT CAN THEY EXPECT?

Rose Tattoo was brought about in a romantic sense. It is about rebellion, passion and everyday struggles. Over the years Rose Tattoo has contributed to the sound of Rock n Roll. People well up in the chest and have fire in their eyes. Our music did that, the love for country, and flag, and a way of life. I am so impassioned by what we do, we give it one hundred percent and make a commitment to all of you that you will be entertained.

DO YOU HAVE A SPECIAL MESSAGE FOR YOUR FANS BEFORE CONCERT NIGHT?

Thanks for keeping the faith, we will never let you down.

TELL ME A LITTLE ABOUT LIFE ON THE ROAD?

Once upon a time it was all about sex, drugs and rock n roll. Now it is all about diet, exercise and watching what you drink and getting a good nights sleep. We would have endless hours sitting on buses or trucks all for one and a half hours PEOPLE CALL YOU 'A CHAMPION OF CHILDREN', FOR YOUR WORK WITH DISADVANTAGED AND SICK CHILDREN, WHERE DID THIS STEM

It started with me visiting a guy in jail on behalf of his friends and family. He loved Rose Tattoo, well we were a very male band with songs that appealed to everyone. He told me that when he got out in a few years he wanted to build a halfway house for boys.

I saw how many kids were in need and decided that I wanted to help them any way I could.

I associate with the street kids - This is who I am, there but for the grace of god. I would be in Jail or on the streets if it wasn't for music.

WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO SOMEBODY JUST STARTING OUT IN THE INDUSTRY?

Don't ever give up on the music, but don't ever expect it to give you a living. Music is food for the soul, this doesn't mean food on the table. There are no shortcuts, it is all about hard work.

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


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I don't know about you, but I am one Gal that loves her musical theatre. Unfortunately I don't get much time to go to a live show but thoroughly enjoy the experience when I do. I for one am in awe to have the amazing and talented Marina Prior and one of Australia's best-known Oprah Singers David Hobson visiting us in Maryborough at the Brolga Theatre in May. It will be David's first time here and he is very excited. I had the chance to have a conversation with the man himself about the upcoming show.

So what is The 2 of Us all about?

The 2 of Us is a collection of songs from our careers. Marina is a very accomplished musical theatre performer and I myself sing Opera and musical theatre. Marina and I are old friends, we have had a long history of friendship and fun. I think we first performed together in the 80's. Our show is all about stripping away all of the masks and costumes and getting, 'Up close and personal'. We find that our audience engage with us, there is lots of humour, and vibrancy while the show is very upbeat.

Wow, 40 dates on this national tour of 'the 2 of us' in 2018, what is life like on the road. How much time off do you get to spend with your families?

I think that actually it will be closer to fifty dates from memory. We are very lucky as we will be touring and working for four to five days at a time, then we will have four to five days to spend with our families. Luckily Marina and I get along really well together otherwise it wouldn't work. We have a tour manager and a producer that work out all of the finer details of our tour and tell us where we have to be, while making sure that we get there.

What is it like working with renowned pianist David Cameron?

David Cameron just so happens to be a very dear friend of ours as well. He is one of the best all round accompanist's in Australia. He transitions from pop to opera effortlessly and he also sings too. David is incredibly gifted and extraordinary, he is also extremely caring, we have a simpatico relationship. We also both have eclectic tastes that cover a broad and diverse range of subjects.

Marina Prior is the 'leading lady of musical theatre'. From Phantom of the Opera from 1990 to 1993 as Christine Daaė. Maria in Westside Story, and many of our old favourites in between. What is it like to work with such a legend of the stage?

Marina is so down to earth, and has absolutely no airs and graces, she is definitely one of the good ones. She is an extremely accomplished and talented performer to boot. I still get very nervous just before going on stage to perform, Marina doesn't seem to get nervous at all.

You have composed some serious pieces from Macbeth in 1985 to the Orchestral Score for the 2004 Australian movie 'One Perfect Day'. How do singing and composing come together?

If you are composing a classical score you use a different discipline than you would if you were writing for yourself. Composing is a craft and is all about telling a story and bringing the music alive. I have always liked composing.

Do you have a special message for the people of the Fraser Coast?

Please make our night, because we will make yours. Every night is a celebration of music, entertainment and fun. We are looking forward to coming to the Fraser Coast, I myself have never been there.



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
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THE BOY BIGGES MULTISPORTS FESTIVAL HAS SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE



The library staff, inspired by the 2017 Australian Heritage Festival theme - Having a Voice - recorded the oral histories of 18 people who traditionally did not have a voice.

Their stories cover women, Australian Chinese, Aborigines, Australian South Sea Islanders and rural residents.

The exhibition will be opened at 6pm on April 6: no bookings are necessary, the bar opens at 6pm and the welcome starts at 6:30pm.

The Gallery is open between 10am and 4pm - Monday to Friday and 10am to 1pm on weekends during the exhibition which runs from April 6 to 29.

The exhibition features portraits and videos which give a unique perspective into the lives of extraordinary people and include: Former Councillors, nurses and matrons discussing their lives; Nonagenarians whose memories transport you to local places at the turn of the century including Bauple, Maryborough, Tinana and Hervey Bay;

The first power station at Hervey Bay and the family whose ingenuity resulted in this area thriving;

Life as an Australian Chinese man and life as a mixed race couple in a time when mixed marriages were the exception, and;

Experience as an Aboriginal Chinese Man and reflections of his Chinese mother who raised 12 children on her own.

Memories of

With ANZAC Day coming up on April 25, I had a chat to Veteran, Brian Tidyman who served time in the Vietnam War. I honestly could have talked to Brian all day and written so much more than I have here, I will put the full interview up on our web-page at: www.whatsonfrasercoast.com.au. Brian also mentioned an Aboriginal who served with him in Vietnam, Leo Muir who, in Brian's words was "One of earth's gentlemen", The story of Leo really captured me and I spent the rest of my day reading all that I could about him.

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps, and is a national day of remembrance in both Australia and New Zealand. - Kim, Editor.



In Brian's words:

I volunteered for the Army as I had always wanted to Join. I was part of the CMF, (Citizen Military Force) at the time and the opportunity came up in 1964 for me to enlist in the regular Army.

Boot Camp was something that I will never forget, We got there and for six weeks we were not allowed out of camp, we were working daylight to dark doing guard duties. I was In Wagga Wagga, NSW at the time and it was Summer, so grass fire's were around. Because we had the numbers we were out with Hessian bags for three weeks fighting grass fires, which of course wasn't part of our military training.

I went to the school of Artillery in North Head in Sydney and became a Gunner. I was 21 by the time I went to Vietnam.

The old Australian ration packs that we used to carry were probably the worst. They consisted of things like Bully Beef, biscuits that were too tough to eat. Since Vietnam I have a terrible hatred of margarine because it used to be in a can and you would open it and of course in the tropics the margarine would just shoot out in a stream. Some of the food was still stamped 1942 or 1943 and last used in the second world war. Then half way through our tour of Vietnam we went to the American ration packs which was like a smorgasbord. Trouble is ours lasted twenty four hours and they had one double the size just for one meal. These were very hard to carry as we already had 80 pounds on our back. The SLR rifle that we used was 28 pounds alone this we would carry everywhere, even when we went to the toilet.

There are a lot of funny military stories to tell that we can't print. In Vietnam we had what we call Blowflies and we had drop toilets. Smoke grenades would be thrown in pits to kill the germs, well somehow inadvertently a real grenade got put in there and suffice to say shit went all over the



officers mess, well us gunners thought this was absolutely hilarious. I always suspected a good friend Leo Muir he was a full blooded Aborigine, a truly fabulous man, but he never admitted it.

There was another funny one involving Leo and I, we both had a 24 hour leave and we went to the Boozer. Leo used to call me Whitey, and I used to call him Darkie. Well we were walking down to the village and Leo said, "lets go in here", so I said "ok", and no joke this place was black, jet black and I said right-ho Darkie what do you want to drink?. The next thing I know this big hand grabbed me around the neck and held me against the wall. It took Leo about half an hour to convince the guys that I wasn't being racist and that this was just what we called each other. It was a serious incident at the time but we both laughed about it many times after. I carried his casket when he unfortunately passed away in his early 40's of a heart attack. Leo was one of earth's gentleman.

The morning that we left Vietnam we had just completed a fire mission and then flew to Saigon, and then to Sydney, next morning we were on leave in Australia. We landed in Sydney at 1am in the morning, walked through customs then the Army gave us our final leave money/pass and told us to get out of our uniforms and to piss off. We were given no time to come down, to debrief, to talk, not like today. Back then we were scattered to all points in Australia and that was it.

I will never forget the first thunderstorm, I must have been dreaming and the thunder had woken me except I thought mortars were coming in, so I have grabbed the missus and tried to push her under the bed, Unfortunately the bed was one of those that go all the way to the ground its probably why she divorced me actually, ha,ha. I still have nightmares, not as regular but yes I still have them.

I have never regretted my time in Vietnam, in a way it has shaped who I have become today. At the time it was my Job. The only regrets that I do have was the way the military treated us when we got home and the way the public treated us. This was the people that were against the Vietnam War. The biggest problem was that the Vietnam War was the first television war. People at home knew more about what was going on than we did. When I was at Puckapunyal we would go down to pick up the new national servicemen, every time I went down I would come back and my uniform would have to be cleaned, it made me very very angry.

I have some very very close mates from my time in Vietnam that are still with us. This year it is fifty years since we left Australia to go to Vietnam. We don't get to see each other all that much due to geography, but I am going down to Melbourne in a couple of weeks. We get together have dinner and an afternoon of remembering the good times while also remembering the mates that have gone before us. We were only a small Unit with 120 blokes. Unfortunately probably just over half of them are gone. After the military I joined the fire service, I actually ended up becoming an officer.

I believe that there could be vast improvements made in the treatment of the veteran's needing transitioning from the defence force.





Flavours from our heritage

I have been in Australia for 43 years, 19 of those in Sydney and the rest in Hervey Bay, Maryborough and around the Fraser Coast area. I was born in Ilagan Isabela, a small province of Luzon, Philippines.

Philippines



The Spanish have a big cooking influence in the Philippines. We mostly eat fish and vegetables as they are very plentiful and part of our staple diet.

Filipinos grow their own meat like chickens, pigs and ducks. Although chicken is the traditional meat recipe for Adobo, it can be cooked either with pork or a combination of both.

The Adobo as a recipe has many variations and it depends upon the region you come from. It can also be made with added sugar if needed. You can leave a little sauce or cook very dry and crispy.

Ingredients:

1.5 kilo of chicken (pieces) 6 cloves of garlic (crushed)

1 bay leaf
1 tspn black peppercorn (crushed)
1 cup brown vinegar
1/3 cup soy sauce
1 1/2 cup chicken stock

Method:

Combine chicken pieces, vinegar, garlic, chicken stock, black peppercorns, bay leaf, soy sauce cover and leave to marinate in the refrigerator for 2 hours.

Transfer the chicken mixture to a large heavy based pan or wok and bring to boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Remove lid from pan and continue cooking until chicken is tender or until the liquid has reduced by half. Serve with rice.

NOTE: You can also used pork instead of chicker

As you move, you breathe deeply and naturally, focusing your attention — as in some kinds of meditation — on your bodily sensations. Tai chi differs from other types of exercise in several respects. The movements are usually circular and never forced, the muscles are relaxed rather than tensed, the joints are not fully extended or bent, and connective tissues are not stretched. Tai chi can be easily adapted for anyone, from the most fit to people confined to wheelchairs or recovering from surgery.

Although tai chi is slow and gentle and doesn't leave you breathless, it addresses the key components of fitness — muscle strength, flexibility, balance, and, to a lesser degree, aerobic conditioning.

When practicing Tai Chi in a group ... something happens that is profound. A connection occurs as we become part of the field ... the Tao ... the connection of all things. It feels good to do Tai Chi in a group, and it changes and improves the way we do Tai Chi, and makes us feel better.
