



What a privilege it has been to be on the Committee to organise Proud Villagers supporting Love Your Sister! We are four Hervey Bay Mum's who have united with a common goal of kicking Cancer in the face hole and raising some money towards the charity.

- Love Your Sister.

I have followed the Love Your Sister story from the start and have always admired Connie, Sam and the team for their endless efforts to raise awareness and much needed funding for Cancer Research. Jane and I talked about holding a fundraiser a few years ago with Connie and Sam, however Connie was simply to ill to be away from a major Hospital or travel great distances to attend regional functions. So, Jane took her Love Your Sister Swear Jar everywhere she went for a month to raise some much-needed funds.

As the years went by, more friends and family started their battle, continued their battle or lost their battle with Cancer (including Connie on 08/09/17). 2018 started with a mutual friend's diagnosis of aggressive Cancer. A fit, young, healthy Mum of 3 - it could have been any of us. A light bulb moment happened in May when it was announced Samuel Johnson would be attending a Business function - we immediately knew we needed to hold a Fundraiser specifically for Love Your Sister but how could we keep Sam for an extra night? After researching and pitching to Kristie - (Fundie Evangelist) she spoke with Sam who was immediately on board and we worked towards a date in October where Sam could come back specifically to meet his Villagers and raise some serious \$\$ for his Charity.

And so, it began – an overwhelming response to our Fundraiser with 10 amazing Business Sponsors coming on board and 253 people buying tickets in the first 48 hours. Our MC for the evening, Scott Rowe has offered invaluable mentoring and support and we are so grateful to have him on board.

We have had endless people offer Gifts towards our Raffles and Auctions, offer to help on the night or simply buy a ticket knowing that every little bit will help towards smashing our Fundraising Goal.

We are humbled that Sam has agreed to be our special Guest on the night and can't thank everyone enough for your support. Together we will be

kicking Cancers butt!!! Kristy, Jane, Trisha & Sara.

Samuel Johnson was able to take a few minutes out of his very hectic schedule to answer a few questions below:

September the 8th marked one year since the passing of your sister Connie to breast cancer,

It has been a very busy month for you full of many engagements. How are you feeling, how do you keep going?

She is part of my every day and work, it's hard to get my head around (the anniversary). I keep going because Connie would want me to keep going. I've spoken a lot during the past 12 months about being custodian of her legacy. But I'm also custodian of her mission. That's what motivates me right now.

How much money has been raised for cancer research to date through Love Your Sister, how far are you off the target of 10 million dollars?

I've reached every fundraising goal I've set in life, thankfully. My most recent, most ambitious goal (they must grow with each setting!) is 10M and I didn't just promise that to my dying sister, I promised it to our 560,00-strong village. It's my verbal-will theory. It's much easier to ignore a personal goal, so to combat that I tell everyone I can, as insurance. Then the potential egg on my face becomes a real motivator. We're just over \$8M now. But a million is tough to make and I don't treat the rest as a given in any way.

Where will the funds raised be directed at the upcoming event in Hervey Bay this October Towards the Connie Johnson Breast Cancer Lab at the Garvan Institute and towards a new metastatic tissue bank, to blve ALL cancers. 100% of donations are spent on researchonly. No admin. No skimming., No bullshit.

What would be your advice to someone going through a similar journey, please give us a short message to families struck by cancer – whether it's for the person diagnosed, or the support around the person diagnosed.

There is no right and wrong when it comes to cancer. Everyone is different, and people care in strange ways. Be patient with everyone. Listen. And talk. And cry. And laugh in the face of it.

LOCAL LAUNCH OF THE SO BRAVE 2019 CALENDAR

Earlier this year, March to be precise, we introduced you to Kat Thompson, breast cancer survivor and So Brave model ambassador about being chosen for the 2019 So Brave calendar. Now seven months later the calendar is complete and Kat features in a national body paint artwork calendar to raise funds and awareness for breast cancer in young women.

This will be the third fund-raising calendar for Australia's Young Woman's Breast Cancer Charity-So Brave who raise awareness and funding for breast cancer research whilst empowering young breast cancer survivors.

Kat Thompson was only forty years old when diagnosed with breast cancer. Recently she was transformed by a body-paint artist for the calendar which officially launched in Melbourne in September.

Kat says: "The reason I chose to participate in the So Brave 2019 breast cancer fundraising calendar is when I finished months of grueling treatment I was so relieved it was all over, I was done, I was so happy. I could put all this unpleasantness behind me and move on with my life. What was I going to do? How was I able to pay it forward? I had to do something, I had to help others that may be in the same position that

At my first chemo treatment I was given a So Brave calendar by my breast care nurse. I had been feeling so grey and yuck and here was this brightly coloured calendar with beautiful young women who had been down the same path, taken similar journeys to me and they were smiling and living their lives. I was so inspired by it all and thought to myself, if they could get through all this nastiness then I could too, it really helped with me wanting to stay positive and believe in myself and that I would get through it. I had to believe that. I went home after chemo and put my


calendar up on the wall in my kitchen so I could look at it every day and be reminded of the colour in the world and help support myself through the journey I was taking. It worked. I joined So Brave and haven't looked back. If I can help even one young woman be breast aware and help prevent breast cancer in any way, then that's what I'll

Throughout my journey so far, I have held the belief that whatever happened it would be ok, my four daughters would be great, their life wouldn't be changed too much from this horrible illness, my relationship became stronger, I adored my girls more and now I'm living my life again as I believed I would.

Kat added: "My page sponsor for April 2019 is Kingston Estate and I am very thankful for all their support.

Each year So Brave creates a captivating fundraising calendar featuring twelve young women who are breast cancer survivors. The women are transformed with body art and are photographed for the annual





fundraising calendar. The photographs depict the metamorphosis that each young

woman has gone through during their body paint photo-shoot and breast cancer journey.

Young breast cancer survivor, CEO and Founder of So Brave, Rachelle Panitz, states:

"The calendar is a celebration of the women and of their bravery in facing breast cancer and in sharing in this bodypainting experience to raise awareness and money to fight this disease. Our young breast cancer survivors truly are SO BRAVE". So Brave has transformed thirty six young breast cancer survivors. All survivors were diagnosed with breast cancer before they turned forty.

The 2019 calendar features young women from Tasmania, Victoria, NSW, Queensland, WA and South Australia. This is the first time that models from WA and Tasmania have been selected.

Rachelle concludes: *2018 has been an incredible year of growth for So Brave and we are thrilled to be able to bring our beautiful imagery and mission to raise awareness to even more communities across Australia *

*Our body-painted young breast cancer survivors are iconic to our brand and signify the amazing beauty, strength and bravery of these young women. We hope to continue to raise awareness across Australia and fund vital research and education to ensure the next generation has better diagnosis, prevention, treatment and monitoring for breast cancer."

*Funds raised from the sale of the 2019 Calendar will go to So Brave's mission programs of empowerment, education and advocacy and directly funding breast cancer research."

Many of Mansong's performances are in the community, for the good of community. Others are professional shows where we are engaged by untities for fundinaising events or often for pure entertainment.


Several performances each year are stand alone shows, with musical arrangements by MD Carob culminating in 2017 with a show at our wonderful regional theatre, The Broige.


This was attended by some 400 followers, encouraging us to schedule another show for 2018.

HEALTH TIPS FOR THE FRASER COAST COMMUNITY

What is prostate cancer?

Prostate cancer is a cancer affecting the prostate gland. It develops when abnormal cells in the prostate gland grow quicker than a normal prostate, forming a tumour. Prostate cancer is the second most common cancer diagnosed in men in Australia. It is the third most common cause of cancer deaths. One in seven men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer by the age of 85. It is more common in older men. In 2014, in Australia more than 18,000 new cases of prostate cancer were diagnosed. In 2015, there were 3195 deaths from prostate cancer in Australia.

Is prostate cancer preventable?

There is no proven prostate cancer prevention strategy, however the risk of prostate cancer can be reduced by making healthy choices, such as exercising regularly in younger years and eating a healthy diet. Studies have shown that choosing a low-fat diet, eating more fat from plants than from animals, increasing the amount of fruit and vegetables in the diet, and reducing the amount of dairy products can reduce the risk of prostate cancer, but these strategies should be implemented early and during middle age, rather than later in life.

What are some of the symptoms men need to look out for?

With early prostate cancer there are no symptoms, which means the cancer must be diagnosed through screening. However, sometimes some urinary symptoms can prompt a person to visit a Physician or Urologist to diagnose this cancer. The symptoms can include frequent urination, particularly at night, pain on urination, some blood in the urine or semen, a poor stream or, with advanced cancer, there can be pain in different parts of the body.

How is prostate cancer diagnosed?

Prostate cancer can be diagnosed by PSA screening, performing a digital rectal examination on the prostate, or by further investigations in the form of an MRI to assess the risk. Cancer is usually confirmed by performing a prostate biopsy.

What is the next step after diagnosis?

Once prostate cancer is diagnosed, we need to do staging investigations to assess the amount of carcinoma in the body. We do a bone scan, CT scan, and sometimes an MRI and PSMA PET scan. Once the patient is diagnosed and staged, we can decide whether he has localised prostate cancer, or locally advanced or advanced carcinoma. Based on the stage of the carcinoma, the patient may require treatment. With organ confined prostate carcinoma, it can be cured by surgery or radiation therapy.

What are the benefits of treatment?

In treating prostate carcinoma, if it is organ confined, our plan is to do a curative treatment so that we eliminate the cancer from the body. In locally advanced and metastatic carcinoma, our aim is to decrease the rate of growth and improve the quality of life of the person.



What top 4 tips would you give a partner or carer about the journey ahead?

Keep the lines of communication open. Communication is critical during stressful times. Talk openly with your partner about how you feel and encourage him to speak openly and honestly with you. It is normal to feel sad, angry, helpless, or worried about the future.

Learn all you can about prostate cancer and the treatment. The more you know about prostate cancer, the more you will know what to expect in terms of treatment, side effects and outcomes. Armed with this knowledge you will have a better idea of what your partner is facing and can begin to overcome some of the uncertainty and anxiety. You can help your partner to become more informed, to understand available treatments, and make decisions about how to deal with prostate cancer. By helping your partner, you will be helping yourself also. Ask questions and seek as much information as you need. Ensure you understand the diagnosis and treatment options.

Go with your partner to his medical appointments and keep medical records. This will also help you find out firsthand what the doctor has to say. It will allow you to find out the facts and deal with some of the misinformation that can come from well-meaning friends and family.

Attend prostate cancer support group meetings together. Many couples find these groups helpful and supportive. Benefits can be gained from hearing and sharing experiences and concerns, with others facing similar challenges.



Speak up and take action to improve your health

On average men live 4.4 years less than women and are at significantly higher risk of dying from a number of conditions, including liver disease and diabetes.

However, regular check-ups, open discussion and making moderate lifestyle changes can have a huge impact on health outcomes. Together these changes can drastically lower your risk of having a heart attack, stroke, developing Type 2 diabetes or suffering from depression.

Is an exhibition by printmakers and textile artists, highlighting the environmental concerns for migratory shorebirds.

The Overwintering Project is an environmental art project involving printmakers from Australia and New Zealand. The project is co-ordinated by printmaker Kate Gorringe-Smith, who took the opportunity in 2017 to launch a print project, across Australia and New Zealand.

Focussing on environmental issues surrounding migratory birds, the project highlights the unique nature of the local migratory shorebird habitats in various regions, and their susceptibility to environmental damage.

Australia has 36 species of migratory shorebirds that breed above the Arctic Circle in Siberia and Alaska, migrating south to spend the major part of their migratory cycle (October – May) on the shores of Australia and New Zealand. The route they fly annually between their two homes is called the East-Asian-Australasian Flyway, and their journeys link 23 countries from New Zealand to Russia along the coast of Asia through which they fly, stop to rest and refuel, and breed. 50 million migratory waterbirds travel this 25,000 km circuit every year. Many of the sites visited on the epic journey have global significance, and are also listed under the Ramsar Convention Treaty as internationally significant wetlands, and are Key Biodiversity Areas.

Largely due to their dependence on habitat in every one of the 23 Flyway countries – most of which number among the fastest-growing economies on the planet – migratory shorebirds are the fastest declining group of bird in Australia.

The Project has two significant aims: firstly, to raise awareness of Australia and New Zealand as the major destination for migratory shorebirds of the East Asian-Australasian Flyway, as they spend the greatest single portion of their migratory cycle on our shores:

September/October to April/May.

Secondly, to help raise community and individual awareness about the importance and intrinsic value of local shorebird habitat, both to the environment and the community at large. The built environment has the potential to endanger sensitive habitats, leaving the birds with nowhere to rest.

As their home for the majority of the year, we have a particular responsibility in Australia and New Zealand to preserve their critical overwintering habitat. Overwintering along the shores of the Great Sandy Straits has many advantages for shorebirds visiting this part of Queensland. The Straits are situated between Hervey Bay in the north, along the Mary River estuary and the mainland shoreline just north of Rainbow Beach. Fraser Island makes up its Eastern boundary. The Straits are very tidal and wide sandbanks bordered by extensive mangroves provide a mostly safe and extensive habitat for the migratory birds - unlike parts of Hervey Bay, where the birds often compete with human and canine disturbance. It is in this region that many of the Maryborough Printmakers have sourced their subject matter for the exhibition.

In June 2017, members of the group visited Poona as a preliminary exploration of habitat, and from there decided how to take the project forward by holding an exhibition focussed on the Fraser Coast Region. It was decided to also invite fibre artists to exhibit, with five artists contributing printed and stitched polymer sheer hangings 2.5 meters by 75 cm, as well as tapestries based on the Overwintering Project themes. Printmakers from Brisbane and interstate have also asked to be included. The Maryborough Printmakers are based at Gatakers ArtSpace, 311 Kent Street, Maryborough, where there is a dedicated printmaking studio. We conduct regular workshops, with both local and visiting tutors, and the studio is available for a small fee to local printmakers. The studio is under renovation at the present time, but will be available again in the near future.

It is hoped that the exhibition raises awareness of the needs of these beautiful migratory birds and we welcome visitors and contributors alike to attend our opening on Friday November the 2nd 2018, at 6.00pm. The exhibition begins on October 29th and is open until 25th November, at Gatakers ArtSpace, 311 Kent Street, Maryborough Q 4650



John Waters has enjoyed a huge career spanning the decades and done everything from television to stage to screen and many things in-between. I caught up with him via phone to talk to him about his upcoming show at the Brolga. But honestly I could have talked and listened to him for hours, John may be almost seventy, but is certainly showing no signs of slowing down.

You created Lennon - Through a Glass Onion way back in 1992 with Stewart D'Arrietta, where did the idea/inspiration come from?

I had been mulling over creating a small theatre show. At the time I wasn't really sure about the music that I wanted to use.

John's songs are very autobiographical. I am really into music that weaves a spell and tells a story, I also wanted something that was completely different than just a cover act.

An opening came up in a local theatre for a show, so I had about six weeks to write the whole thing, and to learn all of the songs, but we got there in the end it was a great experience.

The song 'Glass Onion' was actually John Lennon's postscript to the Beatles.

Lennon - Through a Glass Onion is a bit of psychedelic imagery, many of John Lennon's lyrics were littered throughout with his tongue in cheek humour. Now after performing this show for so long It is almost as if I am looking at Lennon through a glass onion. Things are distorted slightly, and appear a bit warped as you peel away the layers.

oughout the show many hits are played and sung n Lennon's solo hits to collaborations with Paul Cartney. What is your favourite Lennon song?

Our show concentrates more on the songs that John Lennon wrote, and some that may have had a slight influence by Paul McCartney. I remember, as a teenager of about sixteen or seventeen I would be riding my bike around, at the time I would listen to the song Strawberry Fields, and I remember that it was like no other song that I had ever listened to before, the words and the chord progressions were amazing. This song still remains to this day one of my favourites.

The show did a 16 week season in New York, what year

Yes, this was in 2014-2015, New York was where he lived and died. New York has a really rich source of great theatre. Our show certainly got its share of praise. Many New Yorkers embraced it.

How hard was it in the beginning to learn the

Well growing up in London, in fact being born and bred there, I knew every dialect as I had listened to them all growing up. So thankfully it wasn't a huge stretch for me and it came quite naturally.

In December this year you will celebrate your 70th Birthday, how will you spend it?

Well that will mean ${\rm I}$ am bloody old! I am healthy and fit, so I actually feel younger than that. It is pointless to worry about your age as there is nothing you can do about it.



With 170 people, 46 old cars, a little chilly weather, and 1600 km of some challenging driving tracks this year's Dunga Derby has been described by participants as the "best one yet!"

The 4-day adventure took the teams off the beaten track and challenged the old cars with driving through everything from windy rainforest ranges, dusty drought affected plains, steep mountain climbs and over thirty water crossings.

The off-road event highlights included a Highlands Games at the Standing Stones Glenn Innes, the 'Dungas Got Talent' show at the Deepwater Hotel and a glamorous dinner in the famous Jondaryn Woolshed.

Whilst experiencing amazing country hospitality, camaraderie and at times some friendly rivalry, the teams had a ball - and it's all for a good cause.

The Dunga Derby raises funds for the Fraser Coast Charity Rally for a Cause. The Dunga Derby this year raised just over \$212,000 taking the total funds raised in the four years of the event to \$735,000. All funds raised stay on the Fraser Coast, assisting families affected by life-limiting medical conditions or tragic circumstances.

To date fifty five local families have been assisted by funds raised by the Dunga Derby participants. The charity receives nominations from the community for families that may be impacted by illness, disabilities or sudden loss. If the nomination meets the eligibility criteria the charity engages with the family to help ease any financial strain where they can.

One team on the Dunga Derby this year included the D'Amico family from Maryborough. Rally for a Cause assisted the family last year to purchase a hoist to aid them to care for their disabled son Cameron at home. After receiving this assistance from the charity and hearing about the Dunga Derby event, they decided they wanted to be a part of it as well. Garry & Amy, along with family member Matthew bought themselves an old PT Cruiser and calling themselves "Team Cameron's Way" in honour of their son, set about getting the vehicle 'Dunga' ready and fund-raising for their place in the event.

The PT Cruiser was an iconic part of this year's rally – tackling the challenging drive with no problems at all (much to the surprise of the events mechanics)!

"The charity does an awesome job helping those who need it", said Amy. "I was a recipient a year ago and I am extremely grateful for the help we received. I felt it was my turn to pay it forward and raise some funds for others who need it. It was so much fun, and we are hooked – Team Cameron's Way and the PT Cruiser will be back again next year for sure!

To qualify as a "Dunga" the vehicle must be over ten years old and cost under \$2,000. Teams consist of 3-4 people who are happy to share the driving. A registration fee covers all of the main meals, camping fees and entertainment. Each team then has a responsibility to raise a minimum \$2,000 which goes directly to the Charity efforts.

The 2019 Dunga Derby will be held from the 1st to 4th August, with registrations opening in January 2019

On Sunday there are two races. Race 1 begins at 11am and goes for approximately thirty minutes as does Race 2 at 1pm. This fantastic event is supported by the Beach House Hotel, Handy Hire and Wide Bay Cranes.

The best spot to catch all the action is along the Esplanade between Torquay, near the surf club all the way down to Scarness, opposite the represents the start and finish line.


