

Like many people of the generation, my childhood in the eighties and nineties was dominated with the songs and music from Iconic band Cold Chisel.

These songs weren't just words on paper, but each lyric told a story. Most of us could associate and identify with the meaning and with the mood of the music.

With vocals by both Jimmy Barnes and Ian Moss, Cold Chisel had many hits including Khe Sanh, Knockin' on Heaven's Door, and Cheap Wine. The nightclubs at the time were pumping out these tunes to hot bodies letting loose on the dancefloor every Friday and Saturday night, in those carefree nights of fun when life stretched out ahead of us and we all dreamt of the future.

For me personally, my favourite Cold Chisel song of all time is When the War is Over, I know this song word for word and have been known to listen to it repeatedly, much to the annoyance of those around me.

As a solo artist Ian Moss is definitely in a league of his own.

I was lucky enough to have a chat via phone with legendary Australian singer, guitarist and songwriter Ian Moss a couple of weeks ago. He is softly spoken, and one of the humblest people that I have ever talked to. Here is a man that doesn't necessarily need or feel comfortable with the attention that his songs garner but just enjoys performing the music.

What was it like as a child growing up in Alice Springs?

I remember the absolute freedom, they were the days of not worrying about the fear of being abducted or anything sinister like that. Our parents would just tell us to be home before dark. They were great days just hanging out, having fun and playing with your mates.

Tell us a bit about your years in Cold Chisel?

I have to say that the Journey was more fun than actually getting there, as the experience is what shaped and moulded us. The early years were hard, but we all went through it together.

Back then, unemployment was high, and gigs were few and far between. But we all knew that we just wanted to play music. Of course, none of us could see into the future but I quietly dreamed and hoped for our success.

During your decade with Cold Chisel, what life experiences or lessons did you take away?

I think the biggest lesson that I learnt was to have a commitment of energy in every show. This was something that Barnsey was particularly good at, as was Don Walker they would pick you up on your mood and then get on your case about it. This was a strong lesson to learn as this was our living. We had to make sure that we left an impression and that we always gave every performance our best shot.

Your debut single as a solo artist was called Tucker's Daughter and came out in 1989, selling more than 73,000 copies. Tell us a little about this album?

Unintentionally it turned into a good old-fashioned boy girl love song. I wrote the music and was working and struggling with the lyrics. I remember I was living in LA at the time and had the words 'Build me up, tear me down' but that was about all I had, so Don Walker helped with the lyrics and ended up co-writing it with me.

As a performer who have you performed with that either fulfilled a dream of yours or that you had to pinch yourself to believe?

The one that comes to mind would be when I was the support act for Eric Clapton in 2011. Unbeknown to me he was on the side of the stage watching me and apparently as I walked off, he stood up and applauded. I was told that he very rarely does that. This struck a chord and definitely left an impression.

Tell us about your new album, self-titled "Ian Moss" what does this album signify?

This is my first solo album in nine years and represents to me the first time that I have written the lion's share of the music. People actually get to hear me rather than just bits and pieces. This album was produced by Peter Walker who also produced Cold Chisel's debut album back in 1978 and features some pretty special songs.

What can people expect to see if they come to an Ian Moss concert?

They will see a Solo Acoustic performance with a big sound system, a stomp box and lots of dynamic range. I will be playing some new songs as well as songs from my Matchbook album, as we celebrate the 30th anniversary of the album this year.

What do you like to do in your down time?

Not sure about my down time but I am a pilot, I don't have a plane yet so fly my friends' plane when I get a chance. I got my qualifications partly with passion but more as a little achievement for me. Studying and taking exams was a great opportunity to challenge myself. I actually failed the written test the first time and had to go back and study again!



LEARN NEW SKILLS AT ARMY CADETS

hen it comes to shaping minds of young men and woman there are several values that are helpful to have when it comes to making sure that said individuals are ready for the real world and what they will face. Core beliefs such as respect, teamwork, initiative, and courage are all things that are great building blocks when it comes to shaping the future leaders of our community. These values are some of the things that are channelled in to the young ladies and gents who are a part of the Hervey Bay Army Cadets.

The Hervey Bay Army Cadets are a group that help young people learn various skills such as how to lead and how to take orders, navigation, drill, RATEL (Radio Operation), survival, giving orders and ceremonial procedures. Members are sometimes given the opportunity to be instructed in firearm safety, handling and use under ADF controlled conditions, as well as advanced electives such as first aid, UAV (drones) or robotics.

Alongside these amazing opportunities, fundraising for local organisations as well as being a part of local ANZAC day proceedings is something that is focused on heavily within the organisation. Several camps run at various times through the year – Annual Field Exercise (AFX) in the September, JLC (Junior Leaders Course) in June, SLC (Seniors Leaders Course) in January of each year. These camps run for approximately nine days and offer such an amazing opportunity to do something very different and exciting. In addition, weekend Bivs are on offer throughout the year which are run by the Units, as well as some full days out in the bush if required.

So, if you are seeking discipline, adventure and something just a little bit different consider joining the Hervey Bay Army Cadets.

The process to join is quite simple – go to https://www.armycadets.gov.au/how-to-join/ or come along to the Hervey Bay TAFE campus on a Wednesday evening at 1700 (5pm) with a parent, medicare card and birth certificate and have a chat with the team.

So, go on, give it a go - become an Army Cadet in 2019 – you never know where it may take you.



The Game's Afoot (Holmes for the Holidays)

The danger and hilarity are non-stop in this glittering whodunit farce.

It is December 1936 and Broadway star William Gillette, admired the world over for his leading role in the play Sherlock Holmes, has invited his fellow cast-members to his Connecticut castle for a weekend of revelry. But when one of the guests is stabbed to death, the festivities in this isolated house of tricks and mirrors quickly turn dangerous. Then it's up to Gillette himself, as he assumes the persona of his beloved Holmes, to track down the killer before the next victim appears. The danger and hilarity are non-stop in this glittering whodunit set during the Christmas holidays.

Director and Z-PAC President Liane Mills said she was initially drawn to this play because it combined the things many of our audiences enjoy so much – mysteries and comedies. However, she soon discovered it to be so much more, with the main character being William Gillette a fascinating man in real life who adapted Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes' books for the screen, created many technical innovations for the stage, introduced the signature Sherlock Holmes curved pipe and deer-stalker hat, and coined the phrase elementary my dear fellow (later adapted to Elementary my dear Watson).

Liane said her cast ranges in age from 21 to 84 and they all loved working together. Theatre is a very special activity where you can put together people of all ages and all backgrounds and they can work together on equal footings to produce something that can be enjoyed by so many.



Or alternatively,

Iced Latte for cafes that don't produce cold drip coffee this drink is served with a glass of ice-cold milk and then a double shot of coffee poured over the top to form a marbled finish.

Comfort Kitchen Keeps On Giving

Comfort Kitchen opened the first Wednesday night in May 2012. A week later the newly formed Comfort Kitchen team had its first meeting together with a team of twelve. There was to be two teams, an early team to prep the meal and then the second team to serve from 5.30pm. Comfort Kitchen soon proved that there was a need for a healthy free three course meal for people doing it tough in our community as there was up to twenty people arriving to get a meal. Over the coming weeks and months, the numbers grew each week and we were soon preparing meals for 80 guests each week.

The Comfort Kitchen volunteers grew as the program grew, with about fifty people volunteering their time to support the homeless, socially isolated and financially struggling. Hervey Bay Neighbourhood Centre was starting a new era of assisting those in need, much further than they could before due to the new premises at the Community Centre. The Management Committee felt that it was time to introduce catering for the community visitors. We then started catering using the amenities, halls and rooms for community activities and meetings. The income from these continue to help fund the Comfort Kitchen dinner but we still require community donations to continue to deliver this valuable service for those who are struggling.

Donations have been received from Prime Agents, Rotary Club of Hervey Bay Sunrise, Zonta, Kerry Campbell, Woolworths Hervey Bay, Urangan Pier Markets, The Ladies of the Uniting Church, the Hervey Bay RSL and individuals from the community via pledges (fortnightly direct debit accounts). After nearly seven years and over 40,000 meals later the Comfort Kitchen dinner is serving 120-200 guests per week. We would like to thank our team of volunteers who continue to support this program and also to our donors for their generous financial support.

About the artist:



Jon Vea Vea was born and bred in Hervey Bay. Not many people of his generation can say that! When Jon was born here, Hervey Bay was just a sleepy little 'holiday get-away' for the Maryborough locals. He has seen many changes here in his life time.

While he was born on Butchella land, Jon identifies as a Coble Coble man. His grandfather came from Warah at the base of the Bunya Mountains. Jon also has strong ties with the South Sea Islands. His Great Grandmother was 'Black Birded' and brought to the region to work on the cane farms. His connection to that land and his complex family history inspire many of his original songs. "I like to write songs with a message" he said. "Perhaps people will go away and think about the words. It's a teaching thing."

Jon worked on the railway for a period of time, and credits one of his colleagues there as being a mentor. "We'd just sit together at Isis Junction and in our spare time, after work or waiting in the station, he would show me how to play guitar," said Jon. Jon left the railway after eighteen years of service.

Music had always been a big part of his family's life. He remembers many evenings sitting together singing. "Mom was always involved in music," he noted. But, it wasn't until he had his family of four children and had turned 35 that he started to take music seriously. "My cousin asked me to join a band. That was the real start," he noted reflectively.


Jon's musical career has gone from 'strength to strength' since that time. We see him around town, at local pubs and clubs, his rich, melodious voice cracking the sultry air at the markets. Jon has just returned from a major tour of Queensland regional areas, funded by Arts Queensland. That's his 'paid job'. But Jon is the first to always give his time willingly to perform for community events and fundraisers for the likes of The Cancer Council and the Leukaemia Foundation." I like to help community organizations – to see them blossom." He feels it is part of his 'civic responsibility' to support others.

Jon is an advocate for 'good mental health' and finds singing can help people when they are struggling with anxiety and depression or just add a bit more fun to life. He loves a 'jam' and will drop in to a local coffee shop on Wednesdays to join in. Most recently he has started a group 'Gentlemen With Guitars'. "It's an artistic equivalent of the Men's Shed. Not everyone has the confidence to play alone. Everyone is getting together and learning from each other, " said Jon.

Jon has mentored many young people in our local community, provides free concerts at the local jail and is a champion for reconciliation in our community.

On January 31, 2019, Jon was awarded a Paul Harris Fellow by the Rotary Club of Hervey Bay Sunrise 'in appreciation of tangible and significant assistance given for the furtherance of better understanding and friendly relations among people of the world.'

At his heart, Jon Vea Vea is a storyteller who uses music to share experiences with others. We are all the better for his creative insight and his willingness to share. His commitment to the Fraser Coast community is truly inspirational.

Robbie – Guitar/vocals – I like Pete Murray, his voice and the songs he writes are just so relatable, everything he writes about most of us have experienced at one time or another.

Where did the name Harding's House come from?

Nicole - Harding is Robbie and my surname, we are brother and sister. We have a musical family, and throughout our high school years we had a 500-acre property west of Maryborough and we were known for putting on the local bush bash. We started off with Robbie and myself doing duo stuff, then I met Shane and we added the percussion.

The three of us have only been together as a band for a year now. But as a duo, Nicole and I have been performing since 2015.

Name some of the places that you have played already?

Nicole - We have done a few gigs for the Council, and lots of private ones through family and friends. We like to get ourselves out there so we may come to the park and play just to engage in the community. We have played a lot in Maryborough, like Gatakers Artspace, and we have offered our services on a volunteer basis to charities like Relay for Life. Now that we have done a demo, we are just putting it out there for everyone to hear. We like meeting people face to face and to drop of the CD have a chat and get an idea of what their booking schedule may be like.

What genre of music do you play?

Shane - We play lots of covers but we mould them into fitting the sound with the conga's and different percussion instruments. We could be playing a modern rock song, but we need to modify it to make it fit the way that Nicole sounds when she sings, we manipulate it and come out with a sound that you can identify with.

Has does the song writing process come about?

Robbie - We have a couple of originals in the works, our song writing is a little bit of a collaboration, it is a structured thing, ideas come, structured by Guitar and then we just add ideas and influences that come to us. Probably the idea, the meaning of the song comes first for me and then I work on the music

Nicole – I would play around on the guitar and find a nice tune and then get one catchy line and grow the meaning from there. There is something about what we bring that is very engaging to people, especially when they hear the Conga Drums.

As a footnote, the band would be interested in more work on the Fraser Coast whether that be in a volunteer capacity or as a paid gig. Nicole says, "Paid gigs usually come with more opportunity to meet more people and connect, this in turn, can lead to more paid gigs."

"We want to be taken seriously with our music and to be involved in the main circuit of musicians on the Fraser Coast," says Shane.


