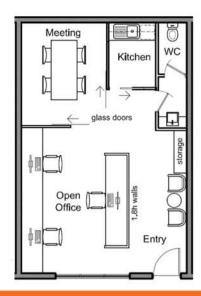
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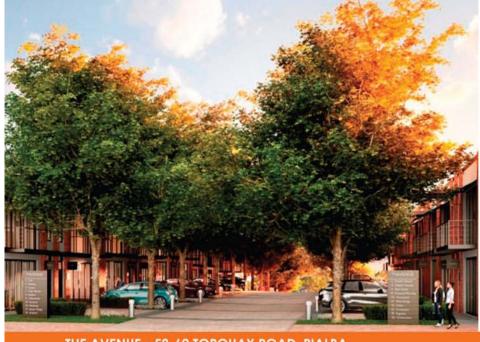

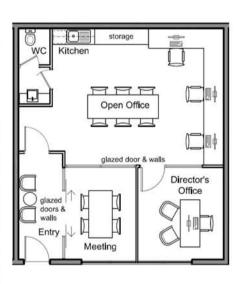

The Club celebrated its Centenary in 2016 and later this year will be the celebration of the 50th anniversary of racing at Action Park, which makes the circuit one of the longest continuously operating motorcycle racing facilities in the entire nation. Prior to Action Park becoming operational, the Club promoted events at its Copenhagen Bend circuit on the Gayndah Road for many years.

The Post Classic classes may be using older machines, but they are super competitive, and spectators can be assured of two days of top class, high speed, elbow banging racing on this 800 metre, super-fast circuit. The Club officials are more than competent at keeping the programme flowing to ensure racing is virtually nonstop with a new race lined up on the grid while the previous race is re-entering the pit area.

Spectator facilities at the circuit include a canteen and bar which will be in operation for the duration of the meeting. Admission to the two-day event is \$25.00 for a two-day ticket or \$15.00 per day

This event is a "no brainer" for anyone with an interest in motorcycle racing, so mark your calendars. It may be a lot of years before we have the chance to see these Post Classics circulating Action Park again.

Learn how to start (and finish) a novel at Lines in the Sand Jestival







To be successful in writing a novel, you need to plan.

That's the advice of Charlotte Nash, internationally published author of six contemporary novels including The Paris Wedding. "We sometimes think of creativity, including writing, as something free and unformed that's almost mystical in how it happens," she said. "But that view is not only untrue, it often stops us from starting, or finishing, a book".

Ms Nash said aspiring writers needed to plan both what they were going to write along with when and how they would do the writing. "This doesn't have to be strict and limiting - such planning actually frees us up to be creative," she said.

Fraser Coast Mayor George Seymour said the Brisbane-based writer would travel to Hervey Bay in September to present two workshops titled 'How to start (and finish) that novel you've always wanted to write' at the Fraser Coast Lines in the Sand festival. "The three-day literary festival from September 27 to 29 is hosted by Fraser Coast Libraries and is designed to inspire readers and writers," he said.

Ms Nash said people who signed up for her workshops could expect a practical approach to writing along with some essentials for creative writing itself and for managing the scale of a novel-writing project. "At the end, I hope writing a novel will be demystified and participants have confidence to start, or finish," Ms Nash said.

She admitted she wasn't good at writing when she first started, "but I loved it, and the love and time is the only way anything good is done". "I wrote my first novel during the Year of the Novel course at Queensland Writers Centre," Ms Nash explained. "That meant I had deadlines and a group to keep me accountable.

"I also really had no idea what I was doing! "Over time, I've learned how to tailor the writing process to suit how I work, and I've gained the experience to know when I'm creating problems for myself. "I don't write with a group around me anymore and I appreciate editing much more than I did when I started. "I think workshops are a good way to discover different approaches when you're starting out as a writer." Entry to Ms. Nash's workshops on Friday, September 27, and Sunday,

September 29, are free but bookings are essential.

"Writing is a journey, and the first novel is a huge milestone in that process," she said.

"I would encourage anyone who wants to write to try it and without fear of what you might write."

Cr Seymour said Lines in the Sand also included other writing workshops, a keynote speech by prominent journalist Kerry O'Brien, guest author talks, publishing tips, a pop-up bookshop and book signings.

He said the festival held a wider appeal than just for readers and writers. "One author that historians will be interested in is Caylie Jeffery who triggered the Under the Lino online phenomenon she when she published a photo of old documents she found in her home," Cr Seymour said.

"People interested in history will also enjoy the talk by Melissa Fagan who delved into the background of her mother's family to write about McWhirters, the well-known Fortitude Valley department store.

"Added to that, artists and arts organisations of all kinds can benefit from the workshops and one-on-one advice appointments being offered by representatives of the Arts. Law Centre of Australia."

Ever heard the phrase 'you should see a specialist' when you have experienced an injury or illness. It's good advice, but knowing what each specialist does is not always easy. The following 'go to' list aims to help you know who to turn to in your time of need.

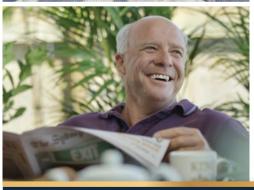

Shares with us his favourite Recipes.



The year is flying past and our winter (as such) is nearly done. Our Arkarra LOW+SLOW pop-up food stall has popped up at many events across the Fraser Coast. We recently showcased the very best in seafood with our hearty Seafood Chowder at the Hervey Bay Seafood Festival. The dish proved very popular so we thought we would share it with you!

I like to use a pasadura bun as a bowl and cut a hole in the top of the bun and scoop out and press in some of bread to create a cavity. The flavours of our local seafood really are superb in this dish.

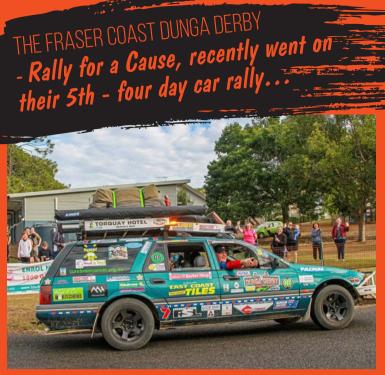
For presentation, I like to top the bread bowl with a couple of quickly fried prawns or mussels, a dollop of sour cream and some corn chip dippers. And add a few dollops of beetroot mayo to the plate for colour.

Keep an eye on our specials board at Arkarra for this dish from time to time too

- Heat 30g of butter in a large pan, then add 2 rashes of finely diced bacon. Cook over low heat for 5 minutes. Remove bacon from pan and reserve.
- ✓ Add another 30g of butter, stir in one each of finely chopped leek, carrot, celery and potato. Cook over medium heat, stirring frequently for 5 minutes, or until vegetables have softened and are lightly golden.
- ✓ Add 1/3 cup plain flour, cook for 1 minute, then gradually add 4 cups of heated fish stock. Cook, stirring for 5 minutes, or until mixture boils and thickens.
- ✓ Simmer over low heat for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Add up to a kilo of any combination of fish pieces, scallops, prawns, mussels, bugs etc and 1/3 cup cream and some chopped parsley and cook gently for 5 minutes, stirring frequently, without letting the soup boil.
- ✓ Add salt and pepper and present as described above.

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THE MODEL T FORDS ROLL INTO MARYBOROUGH

A National Event for Model T Ford car owners across Australia is set to roll into Maryborough from the 29th September to the 5th October. The event is held only every 3 years and will be hosted by the Model T Owners car club of Queensland.

Manufactured from 1908 till 1927, Model T Fords were the first vehicles manufactured on the moving production line, and its inventor Henry Ford, oversaw the production of over 15 million of the marque. Club President Don Hill said he was proud to be a part of this important event. "This will be the 13th Model T Ford National in Australia, and the first time that a full-blown Model T National has been run in Queensland".

Dubbed 'Pop Into Maryborough – 2019' as a tilt to its Mary Poppins history, Maryborough was chosen as the centre for the event because of its heritage value, great touring countryside and friendly community. More than 100 Model T Fords from all across Australia, as well as International Entrants, will become a common sight rattling and rolling around the streets of Maryborough.

Tour Director, Peter Cameron, said that the cars will do an average tour of 150 to 200 kilometres each day visiting Hervey Bay, Rainbow Beach and various western destinations. "We only do about 60 kph so we try to stay away from the highways, that's for sure!" Peter Cameron said. The Model T's will be leaving from the Brolga Centre in Maryborough each morning of the event and the club will stagger the vintage cars' departures to avoid peak morning traffic.

If you want to see the cars up close and personal, they will be on display in the Portside heritage District around Wharf Street in Maryborough, in conjunction with the Thursday market day on the 3rd of October.

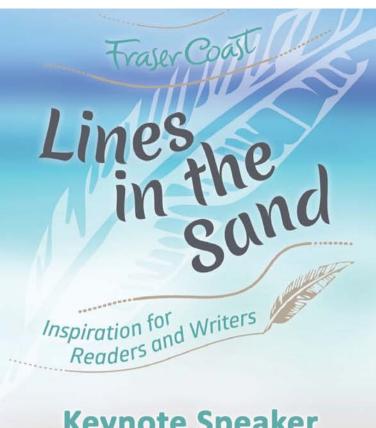

One of our group (guess who?), tried to sample the wine direct from the giant oak barrel. We then stopped off in the beautiful town of Barolo famous for red wines - the most picture - postcard town!

I managed to get us back to our hotel in Alba no thanks to GPS Rosa or naviguesser Jill!

Dinner was something to write home about - we followed the recommendations of our new friend Stefano to the Conti di Rossi ristorante for the most delicious meals.

After dinner, we attended a free jazz performance by American pianist Jeffrey Chappell with local and international players.

Our Alba walking tour guide Alessandra explained much of the ancient Roman history andtook us into underground areas where original foundations from mid-1600s have been restored for public viewing.

Next day saw us set out in our car without a plan except that we took cheese, bread and wine for a picnic! The gorgeous little town of Bra, the birthplace of activist Carlo Petrini, founder of the Slow Food Movement, was our first stop.

We ventured to some spectacular little hill towns like La Morra, Villa, Roddi and Govone and finished at Asti where we stopped at amazing markets offering food from all over the world!

We had our little picnic in a park at Roddi, opposite the most amazing ivy-covered house with incredible views.

Every corner we drove around gave another breathtaking picture of the Italian countryside - the sun finally came out which left us with wonderful memories of our last day in Piedmonte.

Our next train took us to beautiful Santa Margherita to explore such famous locations as Portofino and Cinque Terre.

The rail network is very good but jumping on and off several trains can be challenging. 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Does my bum look big in these pants?

I wonder how many husbands and partners around the globe have been asked this question before?!!

The thing is pants are one complicated beast! I truly believe, that each and every time you need to come back to these 3 things:

What is your body shape?

What are your body features we need to keep in mind? What is your colouring?

Now, the colouring thing isn't as important when it comes to pants but understanding your body shape and body features are everything when it comes to pants.

Let's deconstruct this a little...

If you have long, skinny legs, the aim is to even out your body features by wearing a cut of pant that will do this. So, for my leaned legged beauties out there, you can get away with palazzo pants, wide legged pants, flared jeans, wide-legged jeans, and pleated pants. Anything that is going to add shape (not necessarily bulk) to the bottom half- this is the ultimate goal! On the flip side, skinny jeans are sometimes not the best option for longlegged gazelles! I say sometimes as it depends on what's going on, on the top half. If you're heavier up top, but super lean down south, skinny jeans will just draw attention to the imbalance. Instead, opt for a bootleg cut, flared or straight cut of jean.

For hourglass-figured queens, you gals can wear a pant that cinches in at your gorgy waist and is somewhat fitted around your legs to balance out your glorious silhouette. Hourglass queens can get away with skinny jeans more than our long-legged sistas, but generally look awful in flared jeans or any wide-legged style pants as it can just add too much bulk where you just don't need it! Again, this is all relative to how extreme your body shape is as far as being an hourglass (eg you can be a tiny hourglass gal and none of this really has much impact on you at all)

For our triangle-shaped gals with all that gorgeous booty, steer away from anything wide-legged or palazzo style- this will add bulk in a frumpy way! Just remember, if your legs are the part of your body that hold the most oomph, don't add anymore to them in clothing that will only accentuate this. Instead, choose cuts of pants that will flatter it in the most elegant and intelligent way possible. You can still get all the feels you need to-be that bootylicious, elegant, sexy, sassy or whichever the look you're after. Steer your boat towards straight cut jeans, tapered tailored pants with no pleats, or a structured suit pant. No prints, and no loud colours on the bottom half triangle queens- keep it smart, chic and simple. Your booty

acob had a normal childhood growing up in Melbourne. At fourteen years of age, he began to use drugs, mainly Meth but then soon after, whatever he could get his hands on.

"Drugs made everything feel clear and made everything else go away. It was an escape from reality", Jacob said.

His lowest point was trying to detox at home and seeing the misery that his addiction had caused to those around him, as a result, his mental health suffered. Jacob said, "It crushed my mum, my addiction broke her heart".

After spending a stint in prison and managing to get clean from Ice Jacob headed straight to rehab where he saw people addiction - free and felt the first stirrings of hope.

"Mum never gave up on me."

She was there supporting me right through my recovery, and so was my family which helped a lot. I didn't speak to many friends at the time as most of them still used. But now I have made many great friends here, Bayside Transformations has given me my life back and given my families lives back".

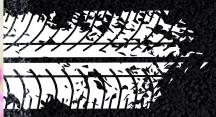

The Fraser Coast Technology Challenge isn't just a once-a-year event. School groups work throughout the year to design, build and test vehicles and machines within detailed specifications before coming to Maryborough for a colossal weekend of innovation, technology, teamwork and camaraderie.

Continuing from last year's successful live media coverage, we have all the action being captured from 8 x different cameras angles this year with the event being live streamed out across Australia to an anticipated audience of over 15,000 people.

"One of the HPV's will have an on-board camera, giving our online audiences a fantastic new point-of-view-rider-perspective from inside the HPV" Jenny said.

"We are excited to have the University of the Sunshine Coast's "Lab of Awesome" crew from the Engage Research Lab and the team from Fraser Coast Libraries showcasing their community digital hub in the gym at Maryborough High on Saturday 14th September. This will be a great opportunity to come see the latest in tech gizmos and gadgets identified with future careers. The activities will include Augmented Reality, Virtual Reality, Holograms and much more in an interactive learning environment," Jenny said.

This year we will have the Optus Truck attending giving us the capacity to share the "My Lap" results in real time, livestream all the action, video interviews and a pictorial history slideshow of the event on a big screen for spectators and participants to view.

Jenny said "we are actively working towards compiling a history of the event and seeking assistance from the community for photos from the early years that will be shared in albums on our website"

Also new for 2019 is a 4hr Celebrity Challenge Charity HPV Race from 6pm to 10pm on Friday 13 September with all proceeds going to support Fraser Coast Mates.

Jenny said, "By popular request we are providing the opportunity to form a team and join in the fun and excitement of participating

in the inaugural 4hr Celebrity Challenge Charity HPV Race on the picturesque street circuit adjacent to the Maryborough CBD while raising money for a worthy cause."

Registration forms are on the website. Teams are to consist of a maximum of 4 nominated persons to share the riding. HPV bikes can be new builds, refurbished or purchased new and must adhere to the HPV specifications. Anyone with a HPV bike they could lend, donate or hire is asked to get in touch with us as we have teams who would like to participate that are without a bike.

As the proud recipient of the Fraser Coast Regional Council 2019 Australia Day Community Event of the Year Award accepted on behalf of some 2000 volunteers who logged over 33,000 volunteer hours the Fraser Coast Technology Challenge is organised, managed and delivered solely by volunteers. Tell us a bit about your Norwegian childhood?

I lived in Oslo Norway until I was about eight. My Norwegian upbringing was quite idyllic in many ways, in the summer we would go boating and, in the winter, we did a lot of skiing. It was a very rich culture.

I was into art and was always drawing and painting. I can remember doing a bit of singing but it wasn't predominant. I did, however, get a guitar at the age of about four. My grandparents also had a grand piano, I remember I was very drawn to the piano and was always playing it.

My parents always had music playing in the house. We would listen to Tom Jones, Shirley Bassey, Frank Sinatra and the Beatles.

What is it about Jazz that draws you in?

That is something that happened almost by accident. I was actually classically trained, I had twelve years of singing training behind me.

In 2006 I was asked to do a few songs at the Federal Hotel in Maryborough. I went there with a guitar player and did five contemporary/pop songs...it turned out that the man that owned the hotel was a Jazz Pianist.

He heard me sing and liked my voice. He told me he was starting up a piano bar upstairs and that he wanted to train me to sing Jazz. After a bit of convincing, I met with him once a week for a whole year at his pub. He would get the keyboard out and we would work through songs together. It was an invaluable learning experience for me!

From this collaboration I developed the beginning of a substantial jazz repertoire. I love the depth, challenge and joy of singing jazz with accomplished jazz musicians!

Other than Jazz what are some of the other styles that you perform?

When I do my solo work with the keyboard, I play a mix of contemporary, pop, soul, and Jazz sol cover a wide variety of everything. I love all styles of music and will adapt to the type of gig and the venue.

Talk us through your song writing process?

For me it's often just sitting at the piano and experimenting with chords. If I hear something I like it can spark a melody. The melody and lyrics will often develop at the same time but other times I get the melody and lyrics first, and then add the chords later.

It's an enjoyable creative process! It can all come together easily and quickly and other times it can take quite some time to finish.

What do you enjoy the most about teaching others to sing?

I love teaching students the importance of singing form your body. It's not just a pretty vocal exercise but its physical, and it's all of you! There's so much that goes into developing a healthy and strong voice. What I enjoy the most is imparting what I know and it's very satisfying when you see students develop to be the best they can be!

What was it like touring Fiji and Sydney with former 'The Platters' star-Esther King?

Esther has an amazing voice, being with her was what really catapulted me into the whole ability to perform. She taught me a lot of performance skills. The stages were huge as were the crowds.

Tell us a bit about Opening the Gala Concert for International Music Festival "EUROPA fest" 2016 with Dan Papirany in Bucharest, Romania?

There was a sense of excitement to be singing in Europe in a beautiful old theatre with amazing musicians! As I was performing, I realised that this was one of my dreams come true!
