One of the Fraser Coast's most stylish events returns to the Hervey Bay Ocean Festival this year. Wine and food lovers are expected to relish the opportunity to once again attend the Coast Pop Up Sunset Pier Party on the Scarness Jetty from 2pm to 5pm on Saturday, August 11 after a two-year hiatus.

Coast Restaurant ϑ Bar owner Julia Paussa described the chic event as a big cocktail party on the pier with food tents serving canapes and representatives of beer, wine and spirit sellers talking to the guests about their products.

"We're really excited to make it the best one we've done," she said.

"We're working on a menu that reflects our local produce."

Ms Paussa said representatives from craft beer maker Brouhaha Brewery in Maleny, spirit and liqueur maker Kalki Moon Distilling and Brewing Company in Bundaberg and wine maker Raidis Estate, Coonawarra would add an entertaining, educational element to the afternoon.

Brendan Bowers, event coordinator for Fraser Coast Tourism and events said, "The whale parade, held on August 18, is a fun community event with floats lighting up the Esplanade from Scarness to Pialba.

"A concert on the Seafront Oval and sideshow alley entertains festival goers before and after the street procession.

"Fans of party, dance and rock music will be in their element this year with Central Queensland band Phineas Q booked as the concert's headline act supported by Hervey Bay's Leonie Kingdom who recently topped Triple J's Unearthed chart.

"A great fireworks display will top off a terrific evening."

Paddle Out for the Whales:

Brendan said, "The sentimental favourite Paddle Out for Whales would take place in a new location, having moved from Scarness to Torquay.

"We made the decision to move the event to Torquay because the foreshore is more easily accessible for participants, spectators and people with disabilities," Mr Bowers said.

"It's a great spectacle and the event has a lot of heart with people paddling out in kayaks, canoes, on paddleboards and all sorts of inflatable craft to form a circle to remember whales that have died during the year and support ongoing conservation efforts."

The biggest picnic in the park- a seafood birthday party is happening at the annual Hervey Bay Seafood **Festival on Sunday August** 12. Fishermen's Park at the Urangan Harbour will be transformed into a sea of seafood to celebrate the occasion.

Event coordinator, Elaine Lewthwaite said, "To celebrate, we have gone back to our heritage in seafood - and to the festival roots to tell the story of the local wild catch seafood that spans generations of local fishing families and acknowledge, the achievements of volunteers and supporters who have made the multi award winning festival a significant event for Queensland.

We also want to thank the seafood lovers who have travelled this journey with festival organisers and stallholders".


Elaine said, "Since 1998 hundreds of thousands of seafood lovers have attended the festival and half of these have travelled from outside the Fraser Coast - and this year is shaping up to again draw thousands of visitors with bookings from all states".

The festival is organised by the commercial fishing families and friends from the local community. Hervey Bay Seafood Inc was formed in 1998 to promote the local wild catch seafood and create awareness of the role of commercial fishing in coastal communities. The local wild catch seafood industry is based at Urangan Harbour and supplies exceptional seafood to local restaurants and throughout Australia.

The festival will be officially opened by Hon Mark Furner, Minister for Agricultural Development and Fisheries. The Minister will also be launching the exciting new promotional brand Wide Bay Wild Catch that the seafood industry has been developing over the past couple of years. Designed to tell the story of seafood in this region from Gympie to Bundaberg, Wide Bay Wild Catch will also have a standalone pavilion with all the information from catch to plate.

There will be over twenty specialised local seafood stalls presenting dishes featuring local heroes of the local wild catch from fish, prawns, bugs and the world famous Hervey Bay scallops. Festival goers have a bevy of new dishes to try and with a bumper scallop season, there is a variety of scallop dishes including cauliflower panna

cotta with caramelised scallops, as well as favourites like fisherman's basket filled with whiting, king prawns and the ginger & lime scallop rolls.

Channel 7 Creek to Coast presenter, Chef Andrew Mirosch and leading Brisbane Chef, Victor Marmysz are returning to host the signature 'Tastes of the Bay long lunch'. Six courses of the local wild catch and matching Sirromet wines

Making their first trip to the Fraser Coast are 2018 Masterchef contestants Jo Kendray and Aldo Ortado with their own pop up featuring dishes from their time in the kitchen. Festival goers too will be able chat with Jo and Aldo at the Fisherman's Kitchen cooking marquee and find out just what it really is like on Masterchef and what was it like to cook for Nigella and Gordon Ramsey.

Javier Codina of Moda Restaurant Brisbane and Professor Daryl McPhee (Bond Uni) have a programme of seafood and science cooking to keep the crowd enthralled all day.

The new look layout has a designed market and exhibit area - Fisherman's Wharf Fair takes festival goers for some browsing and buying with views to the Great Sandy Strait and Fraser Island.

Relax with a regional wine or rock to a top line up of music by local producer, Rob Mackay. Music for all tastes with Golden Guitar winner Brad Butcher and Michael Waugh and some serious park dancing with the rockin Colt Seaver Band.

Learn the Art of WHIP CRACKING

According to Wikipedia, Whip cracking is the act of producing a cracking sound through the use of a whip. Used during livestock driving and horse riding, it has also become an art. A rhythmic whip cracking belongs to the traditional culture among various Germanic people of Bavaria, various Alpine areas, Austria, and Hungary. Today it is a performing art, a part of rodeo show in United States, a competitive sport in Australia and increasingly popular in the United Kingdom, where it crosses boundaries of sport, hobby and performance.

Here in Australia whip cracking competitions have become very popular. With the most common whip used being the Australian stockwhip, this whip is used widely by stockmen and drovers and is perfect for competition.

For something a little different for most of us, Burrum District Active Riders are hosting whip cracking lessons in August out at the Torbanlea Racetrack.

Instructor Gabby Wooler started whip cracking at eleven years of age and has placed in many state and national level competitions over the years.

In the 2017/2018 season Gabby has placed second in Tasmania, and Queensland as well as fourth in Australia for the ladies competition.

In the bullock whip she is currently second in Australia and fifth in the world. Gabby's goal is to keep the Australian tradition alive and continue to pass it on to younger generations.

Each lesson will run for one hour and you will learn the how to and basics of whip cracking. Whips will be supplied for use but you are more than welcome to bring your own. If you are lucky enough local whip maker Peter Thorndike may be in attendance.

For members of Burrum District Active Riders the fee will be \$40 per lesson, for non members who would like to come and give it a go the fee is \$50 per lesson.

HERVEY BAY 35TH ANNUAL COMPETITIVE GRADUATE STATE OF STA



The Hervey Bay Competitive Art Exhibition has a long history from the founding members of the Hervey Bay Art Society to the biggest Art Exhibition on the Fraser Coast. It all started with a small group of artists who gathered at the CWA hall on Torquay Road, Pialba for the weekly meeting to paint and exchange idea's.

In March 1971 at one of those meetings a motion was passed to formally establish the Hervey Bay Art Society, Maureen Campbell became the first president.

The group met regularly in the small CWA hall, but the members embarked on a mission to raise funds for the purchase of property that would become their permanent home. The best way to raise money would be to have exhibitions.

The first Annual Art Exhibition was held on the 28th July to the 1st August 1983 at the Hervey Bay Hall and it was a big success. The committee and members grew in confidence and decided to make it an annual event.

In 1984 it became a bigger and better organised art competition with sponsorships of \$1500 from local businesses and a larger number of participating artists. The Minister for Education and the Member for Isis Lin Powell officially opened the exhibition, he congratulated all the people involved in organising the event and for taking such a big step forward. Only a few cities of comparable size would be able to mount an exhibition of such quality he said.

The two judges Peter Paglairino and Ross Calvert said the overall standard of the exhibition was exceptionally high and it had been a difficult task to select the winners. About 100 people attended a wine and cheese party before the opening ceremony. Hundreds poured though the doors of Hervey Bay Hall during the course of the exhibition.

Over the years the annual art competition became a permanent fixture on the Hervey Bay culture calendar. In those early days the venue changed from Hervey Bay Hall, Urangan Progress Hall, Memorial Hall and then to the Sailing Club.

After 10 years of exhibitions and fund raising the Society raised \$40.000 and approached the State Government for a 'dollar for dollar' contribution towards the purchase of a building. They were not successful but they had found an old Bakery building in Sandy Street, Urangan which suited their needs.

A change in government encouraged the Society to make another application for funding which was successful. On the 18th of February 1993 the members held their first meeting in the new premises. More fund raising was needed to meet the cost of refurbishing the building. The yearly competitive art exhibition changed venues once again, as the new premises where not big enough to hold the event.

In 1995 the Hervey Bay City Council recognised the need for a Regional Gallery as part of a new Cultural complex, the Hervey Bay Regional Gallery was opened on 3 May 1997. Since then the Annual Competitive Art Exhibition has been held at the Regional Gallery. The gallery was purpose built and designed to be spacious so the number of entries in the competition went up to over 200 paintings in seven sections.

The yearly event has grown and now attracts artists from all over Queensland and Northern N.S.W, the quality of the artwork is getting better each year.

Fraser Coast Council and local businesses are proud sponsors and supporters of the event, and with prizes totalling \$ 6.700, it is one of the biggest art shows in the state.

Art and Culture are essential elements of a community, access to a diverse range of exhibitions enriches the lives of residents and visitors to the Fraser Coast.

The 35th Hervey Bay Annual Competitive Art Exhibition opening ceremony and awards presentation is on Friday 3rd August 2018 at 6pm at the Regional Gallery. The members and the committee of the Hervey Bay Art Society are looking forward to another successful exhibition.



Spin yourself until you're dizzy, compare your reflexes to a Formula 1 driver and see your fingertips under the microscope with the Shell Questacon Science Circus.

The Maryborough Park Show grounds Main Hall will be overflowing with exciting hands-on science exhibits on Saturday 11 August when the Science Circus and its colourful semi-trailer roll into town for an exhibition of its 'pop-up' science centre.

Visitors of all ages can enjoy over 40 interactive science exhibits and watch spectacular science shows as Science Circus presenters hold fire in their hands, lie on a bed of nails and levitate beach balls.

"Our exhibition is a fantastic opportunity for the whole community to get hands-on with science. It's a great way to discover new things about our world and explore the science and technology all around us," Science Circus presenter Ayla Jones said.

The team is visiting local schools across the Maryborough region, sharing flying rockets, freezing cold liquid nitrogen and gooey slime with students through a range of interactive science shows.

"We hope that many of the students we've visited in schools will bring their families along to the exhibition, to explore science together and with the rest of the community," Ayla said.

The Science Circus comprises 16 postgraduate students studying a Master of Science Communication Outreach at The Australian National University. The students spend three months engaging people with science and technology through visits to communities all over Australia.

Since 1985, the Science Circus has inspired over 2.5 million people with interactive science demonstrations during multiple visits to over 500 towns and communities, including 90 remote Indigenous communities.

VANESSA TREGLOAN'S STORY

CLINICAL NURSE MANAGER OF REHABILITATION

I commenced working at St Stephen's as the Clinical Nurse Manager for Rehabilitation in April of 2017. In rehab we assist a variety of people with different conditions, from recovering after orthopaedic surgery, to neurological impairments and stroke, to reconditioning post a medical condition. We aim to improve their function and to gain as much independence as possible prior to discharge; I am responsible for staffing and maintain close contact with our people every day, being sure to keep abreast of any patient developments during the night. I also monitor admissions and discharges and complete patient rounds each day.

Excellence in patient care is the focus of my team and this commences with introducing ourselves to the patient when we start our shifts and make sure they are as comfortable as possible. An outcome of these introductions allows us to address any issues, (health or otherwise) early before they become a

problem. We are continuously looking to the future to see how we can improve the services and patient experience offered in rehab. We are also constantly reviewing opportunities for further staff education and support.

I am originally from Adelaide, however when we saw an ad for a Clinical Nurse at St Stephen's Hospital I applied for it straight away. I had to Google Hervey Bay as I had no idea where it was, but as a family we were ready for a change! Within two and a half weeks we moved across the country. My husband and I have two children and greatly enjoy the



beach lifestyle here. We go for walks along the Esplanade and enjoy doing things as a family.

Ever since I was young I really wanted to be part of a rehabilitation team and to be a part of the patient's journey, contributing to their recovery from serious events such as stroke. I had a strong desire to support people re-gain their mobility and independence and share in their successes. I am fortunate enough now as a manager to be able to live this dream and to celebrate successful outcomes with our patients. I love my job!

ACTING CLINICAL NURSE MANAGER - MEDICAL & CARDIOLOGY WARD



As the Acting Clinical Nurse Manager in the Medical and Cardiology Ward at St Stephen's Hospital, I am passionate about working with people that are medically ill.

I also enjoy working with the elderly as they have so much history and we can learn so much from them.

Originally from Cape Town, South Africa, I have now been living in Australia for fourteen years. I have also spent time working in the UK and Abu Dhabi and I can definitely can say that I enjoy travelling.

While in South Africa I completed my nursing training. I was employed in one of the largest hospitals in Cape Town where they did the first heart transplant, so the hospital is quite well known.

At that time there was a big recruitment drive for nurses to work in Abu Dhabi, so when a delegation visited and asked if we were interested, I embraced the opportunity and took on a job as a Clinical Nurse which I absolutely loved. I have been nursing now for twentyfive years.

ACTING CLINICAL NURSE MANAGER - ALSTON WARD -SURGICAL

I am the Acting Clinical Nurse Manager for a surgical ward of St Stephen's called Alston Ward, and am fairly new, having only joined the hospital in April this year.

It was the weather that actually brought me here to Hervey Bay. I have a young son with asthma and it's turned out to be a very good move. I come from Melbourne, so we had lots of ongoing issues with his asthma, however his health has significantly improved since being here. In Melbourne I worked for Monash Hospital and was part of the rollout for the new Monash Children's Hospital. Melbourne now has two specialist children's hospitals, which is an Australian first, and I am very proud to have been a part of achieving that outcome.

On the surgical ward at St Stephen's Hospital we only look after patients for a short amount of time, so you are really just seeing a snapshot of a person's life with this kind of nursing. My day starts with a hand over along with all of the morning staff; we meet the night shift staff and find out what has happened during the night.

I visit every patient daily and assist some patients to get up out of bed. There are medications to be given, surgeons to be contacted, ward rounds to be done, patients to be washed, and other specialities like physio and occupational therapy to be contacted. There is a lot of forward thinking and forward planning that happens here at the hospital to ensure that our patients receive the best care possible.

I think that it is safe to say that the patients' discharge gets planned from the moment that admission starts and I find that good communication is vital to keeping the surgical ward running.

I am also very passionate about nursing education. Management and education go hand in hand, and I really enjoy seeing how it helps members of my team develop.



When not at work I love nothing more than four wheel driving and camping with my family, we also enjoy our water sports, so Hervey Bay is the perfect place to call home.

LEO CANAPI'S STORY CLINICAL NURSE MANAGER - PERIOPERATIVE SERVICES



I am the Clinical Nurse Manager for Perioperative Services here at St Stephen's Hospital. In Perioperative Services our objective is to provide the best possible conditions for patients prior to an operation. I have been here for almost four years and thoroughly enjoy it.

I have always had an interest in surgery. The majority of our family is in the medical field and I grew up in that environment. It is a very technical and precise world.

I was born in the Philippines and completed my nursing degree there. I

then spent time in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia where I worked as a nurse and also met my husband, and had my first child

While living in Riyadh, I remember how quickly things changed there after 9/11. I went to a shopping centre in Saudi Arabia with my baby in my arms and we all had to be evacuated because of a bomb scare; I literally feared for my life and knew then it was time to leave.

Prior to coming to Hervey Bay, I worked in New Zealand in a hospital in Christchurch. When I arrived there we only had five theatres and when I left they had twelve. It was really exciting to be a part of that growth.

In 2014 the opportunity to move to Hervey Bay presented itself and I saw it as a good opportunity to transition into the management side of things.

I am responsible for a variety of activities from budgets to staffing, to managing five operating theatres, and everything in between. I also look after the sterilising department and make sure that all procedures are followed. I work closely with the supply co-ordinator to

ensure that we always have adequate stock and equipment.

As St Stephen's is a fully-integrated digital hospital, I am able to remotely access information from the hospital which is incredibly efficient, which means I don't always have to come in after hours.

In my spare time I am also a Zumba Instructor; I run my own classes and do these four times a week. Not only is this a great stress release but I also get to meet lots of different and interesting people, and I love to dance and keep fit!





The event, sponsored by Shannon's Insurance, will give budding aviators, aviation enthusiasts and car buffs the chance to see multiple aircraft and many fine examples of our motoring history all in the one place -Maryborough Airport.

Maryborough has a long association with aviation dating back to the late '20s and reaching its peak during the Second World War when it became a base for the RAAFs No 3 Wireless Air Gunner School and No 3 Air Navigation

It was also an important staging point for military aircraft heading north to the New Guinea battle fields.

Parts of that history can still be seen in the guise of the Heritage Listed buildings that dot the airfield, one of which now calls itself home to the MAC.

In recent years MAC have played host to the Warbirds of Aerotec, a Toowoomba based organisation, who bring over a host of vintage military aircraft including T28 Trojans, Australian built Winjeels and the ever popular Yak 52 giving people the chance to experience a flight in a genuine Vietnam era warbird.

For those so inclined aerobatics can be included in the Adventure Flight - you haven't seen the Fraser Coast unless you have witnessed it from an inverted perspective at 5000ft.

The experience of a flight in a warbird starts the moment you get strapped in and doesn't stop until you are helped out of the aircraft at the end of

Fraser Coast Wings and Wheels as its name suggests is not only about aircraft.

On the day there will be a plethora of vintage and veteran cars, motorcycles, trucks, tractors and stationary engines on display as well as many historical displays.

A number of attending pilots will also have their aircraft on display and will be only too happy to answer any questions you may have.

Any other comments?





What kind of music do you play?

Rock and Roll with a few dirty ballads. We play covers and originals and have two albums out.

We try to sneak as many originals in when we are doing a cover show, you do have to pick your crowd though.

Who is the songwriter in the group, and where do you get your inspiration from?

Me, I get my inspiration through everyday life, sometimes I just come up with the riff and the music will write itself, or you will find something that matches the mood. I have books filled with words that just need music, this is where the rest of the band come in. I will hit record on my mobile phone that I keep beside me if I feel inspired during the night.

Six years ago, the video clip for the hit single 'Borderline' was aired and had some success. What was it like making a music video and where did the idea for the video come from?

That was a song that Damien Veness, our previous guitarist, and I wrote while we were down on the Gold Coast on the border of NSW and Queensland. It was exciting, we used lots of local faces. We were on a very tight budget with two video clips in two days the clip 'Borderline was filmed at the Z-pac Theatre here in Hervey Bay, we made the electric chairs ourselves.

We are both anti-government, so we try to slide that in where ever we can. The inspiration behind Borderline was about being locked up and having to face the love of your life and trying to encourage them to move without you. It is that point in your life where you have to decide whether to push hard, or to languish away.

The band received its first nomination as finalists in the 'Music Oz Independent Music Awards' held at the Opera House in Sydney in 2012. How did it feel to be nominated?

It was amazing to be amongst a lot of great artists, we knew that we didn't have a hope in hell, but we enjoyed being there it was great. I think for us we rode a high from that for a number of years. Until the second album came out and we had some success with that.

When was your second album 'Here Lies Freedom' released, tell us a bit about this album?

It was released in 2014, that was our first full band album. We were privileged to have Richard Butler play on the guitar we had Chris on the Bass, and Jason McNabb on drums and that was a good collaboration all of us working together to write the songs again.

the same album peaked in the top five. What does it mean as an artist to make it onto the charts?

It is very exciting when you make it onto the charts. But the trick is not to let it go to your head, it is an opportunity to strike while the iron is hot and that's when you have to get out on the road and tour. We have toured all the way to Magnetic Island, Townsville, Proserpine, Arlie Beach, and the Sunshine Coast.

We stopped the tour when I bought the Skate Park, we have just been doing local gigs since then.

What would you like to achieve as a band within the next ten years?

Within the next six months we would like to release a third album, whether it as an EP or an album we don't know yet, but we want to get back on the road. We have endless material to entertain the crowds with. The boys in the band are awesome musos so it makes the job easy.

As a band how did you meet?

Years ago when we were doing up our second album and we were about to go on the road, and so Richard Butler actually had done the recording on the album and young Ryan was like his protege and he had just finished school so he came on tour with us, Craig Taylor has been playing on and off with Dogwood Crossing over the last ten years and Bennie has been with us now for about a year and a half so we have all known each other through the music circles and different bands over the years.

What advice would you give someone just starting out in the music industry?

Quit, (laughter), no just don't go into it thing that it is all cavier and champagne It is not an industry to make money out of, it is an industry that you do because you love it. If you can do your local shows and festivals and earn money that way you can hit the road and be on the noodle diet, both are good fun so yeah, don't take yourself to serious that is the key.

Why is your band so likable: Because we are normal dudes. The songs tell a story, if people get something out of them that is awesome.

In 2011 Dogwood Crossing released the debut album 'Fear of Change' independently through MGM/Green and Waterfront Records. What was the album all about and where did the name come from, how long did it take you to make?




