Note from the Editor

This year has not got off to a great start for our family. Like many other families in our region, COVID came knocking on our door and came in uninvited. My husband was the target, and he got it bad; he never does things by halves. For those naysayers who say it is just the flu, let me tell you, it was like no flu that I have ever seen. It is best described as the flu times ten when you have it bad. Or the flu on steroids.

Initially, he did spend a few hours in the hospital but was later discharged into my care. This was only realised when he rang me and tried to speak over the phone to ask me to pick him up. Thankfully my husband and I were surrounded by friends and family who helped when we needed it most. Some cooked meals and delivered them to our doorstep - believe me when I say that this was so appreciated and one less thing that I needed to worry about. We also had others doing runs to the chemist or the shops. Thanks to our medic friends for the much-needed advice too. We thank you all from the bottom of our hearts.



The mobility corridor that moves through the heart of Hervey Bay provides a great pathway for pedestrians, bicycles, and mobility scooters. It is important for town planning that we have such pathways for non-vehicular traffic to ensure that our communities are accessible, and that alternative means of transport are encouraged.

The origins of the pathway go back to an altogether different type of transport. It is the land upon which the Hervey Bay railway once ran.

This now seems guite foreign to us in Hervey Bay and a little hard to imagine. It certainly would create a different feel to the city if we were to regularly see trains rolling through again.

Within Hervey Bay, there were stations of different sizes at Nikenbah, Urraween, Kawungan, Pialba, Scarness, Torquay, and Urangan.

The arrival of rail to Hervey Bay increased its popularity as a seaside destination, brought goods from further afield and assisted local farmers in getting their products to the market. It really was the instigator of the growth that would come and go in spurts over the next century.

Walking along the guiet corridor where this line ran, backing on to many backyards, it takes a bit of imagination to think of large trains rumbling along it.

The first tourists arrived on the Pialba Station platform in 1896. In the decades to come many thousands more would arrive and find their way to the foreshore and local accommodation houses. One of the first things they would have seen was the very well-kept gardens at the station.







In 1913 a branch line was opened from Pialba through to Urangan, allowing passengers and goods to be taken to Scarness, Torquay, and Urangan. A few years later, in 1917, the final goal of the branch line was achieved with rail access to a deep-water port through the construction of the Urangan Pier.

Sadly, passenger trains ceased operations on 7 August 1972. However, the line remained open for goods trains until it was officially closed on 30 June 1993 when the last train to run over the lines departed the Pialba Station at 10am.

Walking along the rail corridor now, reminders of its rail heritage are there. Some obvious like old station buildings, others less so, like the landscape and artefacts and machinery relating to the functioning of the line. Whilst it has been almost a guarter of a century since the last train pulled out of the station, its legacy usefully lives on through the mobility corridor.



It has been a few years since I last had a chat with Troy Cassar-Daley. It was time to connect again when I heard that he and his good mate Ian Moss had joined forces for an acoustic extravaganza that blends country, rock, and soul, that showcases the very best of two massive music careers. This is a concert that you won't want to miss.

How has your mental health been with all the disruptions and cancellations over the last two years due to Covid?

It has taken a bit of a beating for me and everyone around me to tell you the truth. But I think how you try to cope with it makes the difference. This is easier said than done, though. It is tough to face when you continually have to cancel or reschedule gigs. When your whole purpose is taken away, that has a considerable influence on your life, so yes, it has been a battle, but as usual, music has been the thing that has got me through for sure.

It is so good to talk about playing again, especially after the last two years. It has been a shitty run for the arts. Everyone knows that we are the first

people to get on board when someone needs a hand, but I feel that the arts have really been neglected during covid. We have been at the end of the food chain during this pandemic. We just have to keep positive and hope that we can continue working and doing what we love.

This will be your first time touring with Ian Moss. Was this something that you had wanted to do for a while?

How did it come about?

We have been friends for a long time. He

came along as a co-driver one day while I was working on a record with Don Walker, Ian was just tagging along, and there was no way that I wasn't putting him on a song with that voice and his guitar playing. So, we got him to come and sing some harmonies with me on Dark End of the Street, the old Percy Sledge Song. That's where we became good mates.

I remember that Casey Chambers myself and Paul Kelly were sitting backstage about to open for Cold Chisel in Tamworth. Ian was in the room too. I asked him if he had ever thought about doing a couple of acoustic shows just for fun and to see where it took us stylistically. He loved the idea. It was like a mutual admiration society which was good, as we both admired the others work. I have been a fan of Ian's since my teens sneaking in underage to watch him play.

We have done one show together in my hometown of Grafton, that was next level amazing, so I am just hoping that we can go ahead with these shows. I am so looking forward to being able to play on stage.

What is it like playing guitar with Ian Moss?

It is incredible. As a guitar player and a fan of Ian's, I really wanted to make sure that I could accompany him in the right way. That is part and parcel of what we are doing with each other's songs - sharing the accompaniment.

I've got a six-string Banjo that I play on a couple of tunes, and it really fits in, you wouldn't think you would hear Banjo on a Cold Chisel song, but it works.

To play with someone that has not only been a great friend to me for many years but has also been a guitar hero of mine since I was young is a wonderful feeling. Ian is the complete package

I spent a couple of years living in Maryborough, and I know many of my musician friends absolutely love Ian and what he does. I can tell you they will probably appreciate more what he does now on acoustic than ever. There is an intimacy that I am pretty sure that you will hear at the Brolga that you won't hear at many band gigs. I can't wait to bring the show up there.

What can people expect when they come to see the show?

You wouldn't think that country and the Rock and Soul thing would work, but a lot of the songs Ian has been a part of for many years, like Tucker's Daughter, tend to blend well. They tend to grow from the same tree as the country thing.

March of last year, 2021, your 11th studio album, The World Today, was released. How deep did you have to dig for this one? Tell us a little about the journey behind the scenes?

That record was inspired by many things that have happened in my life. I lost my dad to suicide, which was a really tough one. It is still hard to even talk about. Some inspiration is drawn from when I was

living and working in Maryborough and was playing and singing in the Blue Heeler Band. I played a lot of guitar in that band, so this album revisits those days of being a guitar player again.

It was hard to dig deep, and we were in the middle of Covid, but once I started the ball rolling, I was able to channel all the stuff that had gone on in my life into an album. The album won an ARIA award last year for Best Country Album, and it just won Golden Guitar before we got to Tamworth for the highest selling record.

If I visited your studio, what would I find in there?

I am sitting in the studio right now. I have my computer right in front of me, and I have a little jar of dirt from where my indigenous family come from. The jar used to be full of holy water given to me by my aunty; she is very catholic. When the water dried up, I put some little leaves and some dirt from the area where we go and have a men's camp, it is a bit of a source of inspiration for me, and I look at it quite regularly. It sits on top of my little songwriting book. I see a little rack of guitars that I still own when I look to my right. I also have a picture of my EH Holden, next to a photo of my family. The Holden is getting restored in Gympie of all places, so in the next few months, I will go back up there and help reassemble that car. Basically, my studio has a lot of little trinkets that remind me of who I am. This is what I draw on when I start to record and write.

I just can't wait to get back and play a show there with Ian because I know that a lot of us loved Ian when we were playing around the traps up there, and to be able to come back with someone like him is just a real thrill, but to be able to share it with all our friends will be fantastic.

If you have ever hired a 4wd on the Fraser Coast, chances are it would have been from Jane and Ashley at Fraser Dingo 4wd Hire. This well-known business began back in 2010 and also offers hiking tours. Ashley saw a gap in the market for short length hiking options on K'gari (Fraser Island). By 2014 a permit was obtained to offer guided and supported hiking packages utilising the network of walker's camps along the Great Walk.

By 2017 Fraser Island Hiking was created under the banner of Fraser Dingo. In 2018 the first supported camping pack-free hiking package was run. The success of these packages is based on the concept that you can walk in pristine wilderness, camp in remote walker's camps but not have to carry or assemble equipment.

2019 was when the pack-free accommodated hike was launched. This brought the hiking packages to the luxury level, working with Waiuta Retreat as a private accommodation option.

Walking and hiking on the beautiful K'gari is a unique experience and a very special way to see the island. When you walk, you slow down and really see the flora and fauna. The vegetation is so diverse, from eucalypt and coastal banksia forest to giant satinay and turpentine trees growing on the sand.

There are 3 different types of hikes that you can experience, explore, and discover.

Adventure Hiker – A fully self-guided adventure hike through diverse terrain and forest on the iconic Fraser Island Great Walk Track. Hikers organise their own lightweight food and carry all equipment. Duration from 2-6 days.

Pack-Free Camping – Enjoy the thrill of camping without carrying a heavy backpack. This fully inclusive

self-guided and supported hike provides a glamping like experience and includes all meals. Duration from 3-6 days.

Great Walk Luxury Hike – A fully guided luxury hike with an inclusive package that includes 4wd transfers, deluxe accommodation, and gourmet meals. Duration – 4 days, 3 nights.

Jane says, "With our pack-free packages, we find that well-traversed hikers can still enjoy the benefits of walking, with the added luxuries of support or accommodation.

"We offer a unique packaged hiking option that includes all the 4wd transfers. Our knowledge of the walking tracks, maps and emergency devices allows walkers to get out and enjoy some of the more remote pristine areas of Fraser Island that most 4wd tours and 4wd's don't go to.

"Our hikes are seasonal and run from March to October, during the cooler months of the year. These months are better for walking as there are less insects and snakes as they are not as active. There is also minimal fire danger".

Over 90km of stunning, unique, and diverse hiking trails are available throughout the Fraser Island Great Walk. Come and see it for yourself.




Delve into Books with Cate Akaveka

TO PARADISE
By Hanya Yanagihara

It's seven years since Hanya Yanagihara's Booker-shortlisted novel, "A Little Life," sharply divided readers with many claiming it was life-changing and others unable to finish it – ridiculing it as graphic misery porn.

Well, she's back and fans need to brace themselves for another 700-page epic tour de force. "To Paradise" is a novel of three parts, its narratives traversing a profusion of human experience and emotion.



Part 1: In an alternate version of 1893 America, New York is part of the Free States, where people may live and love whomever they please (or so it seems). The fragile young son of a distinguished family resists a suitable marriage, instead being attracted to a poor music teacher.

Part 2: In a 1993 Manhattan besieged by the AIDS epidemic, a young Hawaiian man lives with his much older, wealthier partner, hiding his troubled childhood and the fate of his father

Part 3: In a dystopic 2093, with the world crippled by plagues and under totalitarian rule, a powerful scientist's damaged granddaughter tries to navigate life without him - and solve the mystery of her husband's disappearances.

The great power of this remarkable novel is driven by Yanagihara's understanding of the aching desire to protect those we love - and the pain that ensues when we cannot. While not immediately obvious, all three parts are connected by themes such as racism, sexuality, loneliness, migration, and complex family relationships.

Where the suffering and hopelessness of "A Little Life" created an overwhelming experience that challenged readers on how much they could take, this is a more subtle picture of those who feel sidelined or inadequate. Yanagihara leads readers to consider political and social responsibility in the face of global catastrophe. Many are lauding "To Paradise" as a literary masterpiece and the book of the year. It is undoubtedly a multi-faceted and significant novel which fundamentally asks: what is a life, if it is not lived in freedom?

INFORMATION IS THE KEY

Life with a disability can be challenging, but it can often still be fun. In large part, the secret to making life with a disability easier is information. Understanding the NDIS is sometimes like wandering through a maze. Travelling around is never easy with all the added requirements needed.

With these problems in mind, a group of people in Hervey Bay have formed Accessible Globe Services Inc. Run by people with a disability, for people with a disability, the majority of its members must have a lived experience in disability, therefore bringing a level of knowledge and understanding that can only be gained through that journey. Its founder Rod Gothe was born with Cerebral Palsy and has travelled the world working with governments and tourism venues to promote accessible travel.

Using video media, primarily on YouTube and Facebook, Accessible Globe Services Inc targets two important areas, accurate information in the world of disability, including the NDIS and accessible travel for all. Accessible Globe TV will produce weekly programs on two YouTube and Facebook channels. Accessible Globe TV will feature current areas of life with a disability. It will also feature regular programs

on accessible travel destinations. Its sister channel NDIS Reflections, will focus purely on information and issues with the NDIS.

Travelling around is never easy.

Imagine trying to navigate travel with a mobility impairment. Are you trying to find accommodation, attractions that are accessible, and wonder whether the airline will accommodate wheelchairs or scooters? Accessible Globe Services work with HelloWorld Travel Hervey Bay to provide accessible tours.

What services are available through the NDIS? How does plan management work? It is these questions and more that NDIS Reflections will try to answer.



Hit the tracks at any age

Mountain bike riding is not something that I ever thought I would try in my fifties, but a few weeks ago, my husband Jason and I headed to the Toogoom Mountain Bike Track with our brand-new mountain bikes for the Family Social Ride held by the Fraser Coast MTB Club. Neither of us had done the trails before and had not ridden off-road since we were kids.

Club President Joe DiLegge was our guide for the morning as he introduced us to the tracks for our first ride. Joe started as a national level cyclist before he tackled the new challenge of mountain biking to keep fit. He has now been riding for more than fifteen years.

I must admit I was a little worried about coming off the bike, having had a bad accident a few years

ago while on a footpath, but surprisingly enough, I managed to stay upright.

The Toogoom Tracks consist of about nine tracks, including the Outer Limits. To warm up, we

started on the Joey Track. As its name suggests, this is a great track for beginners.
Once we had mastered that track, we were ready to move through the skills park and try out some of the other tracks.

Joe says, "We cater for people of all ages. As long as you can keep yourself upright, there really is no age limit.

"You don't need to spend thousands of dollars on a bike either as the tracks suit most bikes".

When mountain biking, you will need to bring a few things. A roadworthy bike, which the brakes work on, is always a good start. You will also need a helmet, water and closed in shoes. You may prefer to wear gloves, especially if you want to ride often. Pack a couple of snacks if you intend to stay out for a few hours.

The club meets most Sunday's out at Toogoom across from the Toogoom RSL. All events are published on the club's Facebook page, including their Come and Try Days. This year the committee is looking at having some virtual events too. Joe would also like to see more younger riders out on the track developing their riding skills to be safer bike riders.

Don't be afraid to give mountain biking a go. People see mountain bike riding videos on YouTube, see all the big crashes, and see everyone being really hardcore about it. You don't have to be. Go out and just enjoy it. If you have ever thought about it, jump in the car, and take the drive.

After working up a sweat and using some muscles that hadn't been used for a while, Jason and I headed into Toogoom and enjoyed lunch and a cool drink at Goody's On The Beach. What a perfect reward after hitting the tracks. The Salty Squid Café has some great lunch options too.

We had a great time riding in the great outdoors with a great bunch of like-minded people. I would highly recommend the experience to anyone; Jason and I will definitely be back.

AEDAN'S STORY

Aedan was born prematurely at 26 weeks. I remember sitting in the birthing suite, saying I didn't feel quite right, and next minute there were doctors and nurses, people running everywhere, with alarms going crazy. Not much has changed in our lives since that day.

He was flown to Brisbane, and he spent the next 87 days fighting for his life. From day one, he dictated terms to doctors and is forever teaching the world lessons in strength. In the first few days he developed an infection called pseudomonas septicaemia, this made his little head look like an overripe blackened mango, he still has scarring on his face and body from this. The doctor we had at the time said most babies who contract it die. But we knew he was a survivor and had no doubts he would pull through. After several intensive courses of antibiotics, he healed and was allowed to undergo his first major brain surgery.

As his mum, all I wanted to do was pick him up and hold him. I waited 18 days for that magical first cuddle, and within seconds he crashed. He was whisked off my chest, and placed back in the humidicrib, with doctors on standby to get him breathing again. After another 2 days of recovery, his father had his first chance to hold him. We spent the next month alternating days to have those precious cuddles.

DURING HIS TIME IN INTENSIVE CARE, HE UNDERWENT NUMEROUS PROCEDURES INCLUDING BRAIN TAPS, LUMBAR PUNCTURES, BLOOD TRANSFUSIONS AND 2 SHUNT/BRAIN SURGERIES

This was just the start of our journey, he has now undergone 10 brain surgeries for shunt revisions or infections in his CSF (cerebral spinal fluid), he has had Botox treatment, hip surgery with muscle lengthening and spent countless days, weeks, and months at a time in hospital.

We've had our scary moments with his surgeries over the years, but one of his last MRIs in 2018, was the scariest for me after he crashed post anaesthetic, and I spent hours waiting beside him while he stabilised in post op. That was the one ϑ only time I thought we would lose him. There is nothing worse than watching your child suffer and no one knowing what the problem is. Luckily, they found the cause of his infection, started antibiotics, he had 2 brain surgeries, 3 more weeks in hospital and he got to come home with a new shunt.





Aedan will have a VP shunt for the rest of his life (A VP shunt regulates the fluid on his brain to treat a condition call hydrocephalus).

AEDAN'S MEDICAL CONDITIONS WILL BE A LIFELONG CHALLENGE. HE IS GROWING INTO A YOUNG MAN WITH A WICKED SENSE OF HUMOUR AND MIND OF HIS OWN.

I can't recall exactly how we connected with Rally for a Cause; I just remember Jason & Mick were these amazing angels coming into our life to help make things just that little bit easier. We spent many afternoons in our old back yard chatting about our goals for an accessible area and dreams of a therapy pool. At the time Rally for a Cause was just starting out, and we were eternally grateful they chose to help us when the concept for Rally Reno was born. It was a massive undertaking for all concerned, with countless man hours and numerous local businesses donating goods and services. In February 2017 the Rally Reno was completed with the help of family, friends, the community and the Dunga family.

The renos made our yard completely Aedan accessible. He scoots around in his wheelchair, uses the therapy pool at least once a week and lets the neighbours know he is home by banging on the gate. At 4 years old he had a bilateral osteotomy, which is an invasive procedure that takes dislocated hips, grinds the bone to help them fit back into place, and then pinning them so they then grow and heal in the correct place. There was an expectation that he would need this repeated again when he turned 8. However, due to being able to access therapy at home his hips have developed and grown well, and the muscle tone is managed. This means no hip surgery in the foreseeable future. It is also something the whole family can enjoy. The parent retreat, or as we lovingly call it, the bus shelter is a great place for both Cameron & I to chill, take time out and try to relax. He still wheels down to the mailbox to "check the mail", thanks to the special path they built just for him.

We are thankful for the day we were welcomed into the Dunga family. I don't think thank you is enough. We are eternally grateful for the assistance, turning our dream into a reality for our little man.
